Lend a Hand was the theme for this year.

I love this theme as it encapsulates what Rotary and Rotarians are all about and what our World President, Jonathan Majiyabe wanted us to do as we took on board his objectives when we looked at our goals for this year.

In taking on the role of President I saw this year as being one of "implementation" and "action".

We have more than achieved the goals set and we did this through hard work and communication of the Club's progress through the various forums and status reports at the Club meetings. So we knew who was doing what, who needed assistance and on many occasions you were asked to Lend a Hand.

I am not going to go into the detail of those achievements as they are more than covered in the Annual Report but would like to mention briefly three projects that have got off the starting blocks thanks to the work of a number of people.

and recognition of that effort is in the Director's report. The first two are going to need a lot of hands and minds to make them work.

We have recognised and celebrated the completion of various activities during the year. This is a vitally important aspect in any organisation and is often under-rated. Celebration gives us time for reflection and motivates us to go onto the next challenge.

We have had a solid program of speakers and social functions and members have opened their homes for some of these functions which were very successful and greatly appreciated by all. We have also had a the pleasure of welcoming a number of our past members to these occasions and there are a number present here tonight.

During the year we had some time to reminisce on the work done by the Club in past, especially as we celebrated our 45th Birthday in February. In such an established Club it is valuable to know what has occurred previously so that we can acknowledge the achievements and build on them by recognising the experience and resources we have in the Club that newer members may not be aware of.

Membership

We have inducted 5 new members into the Club this year and it has been great to see them fit in so well, so quickly and actively participate and contribute to the various programmes. There is a big difference in being in Rotary and being a Rotarian and our new members are embracing the latter.

The Family of Rotary

Rotary International and this Club acknowledge it needs new members to survive whilst being selective about who joins our ranks. However, it is imperative that we look after and nurture our current members. We also need to be cognisant of where our members are in their Rotary life cycle so that we can ensure their continued participation by tapping into their skills and knowledge ensuring they participate in the Club activities where they feel they are able to.

During the year we have had a few members resign because of changes to their situation. We also lost some members, both past and present, and their passing has been recognised by the Club.

We have also had members suffer illness, loss of jobs and other disruptions to their lives. All these things affect the peace and quiet of

their lives and it is heartening to see our members rally around to provide support, solace and just being there to talk to. It gives me great comfort in knowing that we are such a feeling Club. This is one of the reasons we see the role of the Welfare Officer as being so important and Harry Jerram undertakes this with his usual diligence and sensitivity.

I would like to ask Ross Egan to escort Lindy and Duncan Macgregor to my side .

Lindy's citation was provided with the help of Wendy Carver and it supports our Club's recognition of Lindy's work within our community.

Lindy first became involved with Lifeline in 1990, when she enrolled and undertook the Telephone Counselling training course at Lifeline Manly (now known as Lifeline Northern Beaches). At the completion of her training Lindy went on to fill regular Telephony Counselling shifts, including overnight and weekend shift at Lifeline Manly. Lindy rapidly became involved in a number of other volunteer roles including fundraising. Before moving on from Lifeline Manly, Lindy was also appointed as a volunteer face-to-face counsellor, which involved working with clients on a weekly basis.

Lindy was appointed as Director of Lifeline Hornsby Ku-ring-gai in 1993. At this time the agency was a relatively small Lifeline Centre, operating out of an old house in Hornsby. When Lindy commence as Director of the Centre it primarily provided a Telephone Counselling service, Community Aid service and a small Financial Counselling Service.

Since Lindy's appointment, and under her leadership and guidance, the Centre has undergone enormous growth in areas which include:

- The number of services provide
- The number of clients accessing services
- Efficiency of service delivery, and
- · The number of staff and volunteers providing services

Lindy's role in leadership, motivation and direction has been a key element in achieving this growth in our Centre. We are fiercely proud of our Centre, its achievements and of our CEO.

Lifeline Hornsby Ku-ring-gai has become a vibrant agency providing a wide range of counselling and support services, which are able to offer holistic support to those in need in the local community. Those services include:

- Telephone Counselling
- Personal Counselling
- Gambling Counselling
- Financial Counselling
- Emergency Relief Welfare assistance
- Community Aid

- Suicide Buddy Program
- Suicide Prevention Training

Lindy's current position is that of Chief Executive Officer of Lifeline Hornsby Ku-ring-gai. Her change in roles from a Lifeline volunteer in 1990 to CEO has not stopped Lindy from continuing to be actively involved in hands-on volunteer work, such as meeting with and distributing welfare assistance, providing support for Telephone Counsellors during crisis calls, or even, at times, taking those calls herself.

Another role that Lindy is absolutely passionate about and devotes many hours of volunteer time to, is that of sorting, pricing and categorizing books for the Annual Book Fair.

Lindy also carries additional roles such as Trainee facilitator of a Suicide prevention program around Australia and is an active member of Lifeline Australia committees and forums.

Lindy is a truly remarkable and outstanding member of the community and the Lifeline family at large.

Lindy leads by example, commitment, passion and energy and is someone who it is a privilege to work with.

I am putting a team together to travel to St Judes from 28 September returning 20 October 2004. We hope to do some building work but no special skills are required. I have had a few of the potential team pull out for various reasons and am interested in anyone who may like to join us. We will be traveling as a Rotary FAIM team so there will be an opportunity for travel cost to be tax deductible and the itinerary follows:

Depart Sydney 7.30am 28 September 2004

Arrive Mauritius 4.30pm 28 September overnight at Le Preskil (15 minutes from Airport)

Depart Mauritius 7.00am 29 September 2004 Arrive Nairobi (Kenya) 10.30am same day.

12.00 noon Shuttle Bus from Nairobi to Arusha (Tanzania) four to six hours depending upon time to clear customs and pay for visas at the Kenyan border. Arrive Arusha late afternoon 29 September 2004 and met by School bus. Arrive School of St Jude for dinner.

30 September to 12 October Work at St Jude School (a three classroom building)

13 to 16 October 4 day Safari return to Arusha

17 October Depart Arusha early morning for Nairobi leave from Airport at midnight for Mauritius arrive 5.00am.

18 October Transfer from Airport to Pointe Aux Piments (NW Coast) 60km from Airport. Plaza Beach Resort Le Meridien. Arrive approx 8.00am.

19 October - 11.30 pm leave Plaza Beach Resort for airport departure 2.00pm.

20 October Arrive Sydney Airport 6.30am.

The 'Koongga' Message Stick The Emblem Of The Rotary Club Of Ku-ring-gai

It is appropriate that the emblem of the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai should be the "KOONGGA", which is a message stick used by the Australian Aboriginals. The pattern of markings burnt into the surface of a "Koongga" is not a form of writing. The bearer delivers the message orally and the "Koongga" is a guarantee that he is telling the truth.

Bearers of message sticks sometimes travelled long distances, often through the territories of hostile tribes. The messages they delivered were to arrange a corroboree, a trade meeting, exchange of information and other tribal matters.

The colours and symbols on a "Koongga" vary with each tribe. The ones chosen by the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai and incorporated into our banner are representative of the tribes that lived in the Ku-ring-gai area many years ago. Additionally, the Banner of the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai bids to all who receive it, a friendly "Karitandi", a friendly welcome. Indeed, the Club's "Koongga" and "Karitandi" banner reflect in their own unique way, the ideal of "Rotarians united in service, dedicated in Peace".
