PRESIDENTS REPORT 1998-99 Bob Ivey

Introduction. Another successful year ends in which we

participated in major projects and events, such as Achievement, Gordon Markets, Neringah Hospital and our 40th Anniversary celebration – and I had the privilege of presenting Paul Harris awards on behalf of members to Neil Garling and Peter Kipps.

We also introduced some variation to fellowship activities, which I believe helped nurture even further the solid spirit of our club.

On a more formal front we tackled the discussion of some rather controversial issues; issues that had the potential to divide. However, on each occasion I was honoured to be associated with healthy, mature and well considered debate.

Membership. It was disappointing to see membership decline. However, I am pleased to report that we have obtained a copy of PP John Moon's survey conducted four years ago, of nearly 300 businesses in the Gordon-Pymble area and have commenced the task of entering the hand written information into a computer database. We will also make use of a Yellow pages CD.

This tool will open the door to a variety of membership programs,

such as mail-merged invitations to special nights, maintenance of a list of 'prospects' and their status, etc.

My Aims. Twelve months ago I expressed as my aims to be:

- efficient club management
- not to spread our income too thinly
- to encourage meaningful fellowship
- to implement the Compaware program, and to provide interesting meetings.

Members may judge the level of our successes.

Highlights. Besides recognising the efforts of two more of our members, the highlights of the year as I saw it are discussed below.

Major Projects

Neringah Hospital. The 12 new beds provided for Neringah also brought some worthwhile publicity, thanks to our publicity officer John Ellis.

Achievement98. While attendance trends are down, participants and their nominating companies continue with their praise of the project. We must not underestimate the importance of this program to the community as well as to our club and each of us must continue to give it high club priority. Reviewed marketing techniques will

be implemented for Achievement99.

Gordon Markets. The market continues to be a mainstay for the club.

Computer Training For Us

The most significant fellowship activity introduced to our club, some would suggest perhaps ever in our 40 years, was the computer training idea proposed by Tony McClelland. So simple it was brilliant – that club members who know a little about computers teach those who do not, partners included.

Thanks to the generosity of club members we now are very fortunate to have a club training room of six computers in a member's house – all networked and with E-mail and Internet access. For over eight months now that room has been occupied by members and their partners up to three nights per week.

What has CompAware Done?

 In July 1998 approximately 15 club members had access to E-mail (some hardly used it). 28 now use it regularly to communicate to other members and family.

- Fellowship has been enhanced.
- A club members' computer database of up to date names, addresses. phone numbers. anniversaries. rosters, etc, is used as a central reference file and for creation of rosters. attendance lists, name labels, seating plans etc. E-mail is a convenient and quick way to distribute copies as needed.
- For our 40th function, the table seating plan and place name cards were produced on a computer.

The Club's Electronic Future?

- The Koongga Already a number of members contribute to the club newsletter 'Koongga' by Email. The major advantage of E-mail is that the editor can insert information received without re-typing. Soon, as progresses, training the editor's job will be one of sorting and formatting, rather than creating. Truly a club team effort.
- Many members will feel comfortable using a computer for research, financial,

communication with family and other members – and to share in club administration.

Monday Night Meetings

I don't think we can say that meetings were not interesting, thanks to the efforts of our program co-ordinator Tony McClelland with some fine guest speakers.

Well done Tony.

Fellowship

Home Rounders. The aim of home rounders was to create an environment that would encourage closer fellowship among small groups that perhaps would not otherwise meet. Those who participated indicated that they enjoyed the experience. I believe the program would be improved by making it easier for individuals to participate.

Returns

All quarterly and half-yearly Returns to Rotary International and Rotary Down Under have been processed promptly. The 1999 Annual Statement, with relevant reports and audited accounts (Rotary year 1997/98) have been lodged with the Department of Gaming and Racing; Office of Charities.

Correspondence

Incoming - Our PO box has been cleared twice weekly to ensure that any correspondence requiring urgent action be processed without delay. Correspondence addressed to the PO box has been opened by the Secretary and logged before passing it on to the relevant Officer or Director for action.

Outgoing - The task of handling outgoing correspondence is minor, all of the Directors employing their own resources. The more widely use of E-mail within, as well as externally to the Club, has assisted in gaining

better and faster communications at reduced costs. The lack of total electronic (E-mail) coverage between members does require the weekly mailing of the hard-copy Bulletin to absent Members and District Officers.

Membership

Member's DataBase has been maintained by President Bob and was regularly updated with input from this office to reflect classification, type of membership. address and other changes.

During the year the Club gained 2 new members and lost 5. The year-end membership of 50 (4F & 46 M) is made-up of 30 Active and 20 Senior Active members, with no honorary membership having been granted this year.

TREASURERS REPORT Year Ended June 1999 John Aitken

Club Account

The Club Account ended the financial year in a far more healthy balance than last year with the current balance up by \$1000. This is primarily due to Membership Dues being up \$800 and profit from the 1998 Christmas function up \$1300 compared to last year's expenditure.

Club dues and meal costs were correctly pitched to meet the needs of the club administration for the current financial year.

As discussed at the last Club Assembly the meal costs will rise by \$1 to \$16 in line with increased charges from the Bowling Club, club dues remain unchanged at \$230.

Project Account

Income was severely affected by low attendance at Achievement 98 with net income down by \$11,000. Market income was up by more than \$4,000, due to timing of dividends from Turramurra Rotary Club. Overall Project Income was \$43,948.

To meet the Clubs commitments for the next financial year \$10,000 was drawn down from fixed deposit leaving a healthy balance in the Project Account to meet commitments for Achievement 99 which will occur early on in the new club year. The balance remaining in fixed deposit is \$16,000.

COMMUNITY SERVICE REPORT

Neil Garling Community Service Director

1999 was a year in which our Club was able to contribute significantly to our community as we had an excellent budget to commence the year, reflecting a lot of hard work in fund raising by members in the previous year. Some of the main projects were as follows.

Neringah Hospital, Wahroonga were presented with a cheque for \$25,000 to purchase Medicraft 500 beds costing \$2070 each. This was gratefully accepted by the Hope Healthcare representative & will be used in the hospital that provides comprehensive palliative care both in hospital & the community to serve the terminally ill.

Lifeline Hornsby Ku-Ring-Gai were given \$3000 to be used with other 9680 funds to be co-ordinated by Lindfield Club, to purchase a replacement Van used to collect second hand clothing & furniture, which provides Lifeline 's main source of income. The Van will display the names of participating Clubs.

Provided \$1500 for the Delta Society' Pets in Residence project'. Subsequently our dog 'Lady Scruffy' has provided great comfort in a Nursing home at Woollahra.

Grief Support.

A relatively unheralded group received \$500 that caused them to be elated, & will be used in their very valuable work. Volunteers provide 24 hour confidential support to those who have lost loved ones.

Carers' Night which recognises these marvelous people in the community who devote themselves to others, as explained in the Community Service Bulletin issued at the

Tamworth Conference.

Bowelscan project resulted in the sale of 803 kits through the efforts of members & Pharmacies in our area, including Price's.

Gordon Chamber of Commerce asked us to provide a barbecue at their initial attempt to interact more personally with the Community. Although not a success it may lead to bigger & better things.

Tree of Joy project has been a success for many years at the Gordon Centre & resulted in many gifts for children to be used through the Smith Family & Mercy Family Life centre at Wahroonga.

Christmas Cakes & Puddings.

Initially we thought we would buy 20 from Lindfield, but without too much effort we sold over 100. Thanks also to Ted Price for his efforts in this project.

Thanks to all participating members for their contribution throughout the year.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE REPORT Ivan Cribb

International Service Director

The funds available for the avenue of International Service in this year were significantly reduced as compared to the previous year as a result of two factors. The proceeds from Achievement 1998 were down on Achievement 97. President Bob Ivev also wished to expend a greater proportion of available funds on Community Service projects in the Ku-ring-gai area. As a result the Board budgeted \$9,950.00 for International Service projects as compared with the budget of \$15.000.00 in 1997/98.

The International Service Committee again endorsed the policy of concentrating, so far as possible, on assistance to the South Pacific area. Circumstances prevented this policy from being implemented in full. Nonetheless I believe it to be a sound policy as my instinctive feeling, is that the South Pacific receives a relatively small proportion of Rotary assistance. Regrettably RI does not publish figures as to the amount of funds directed into various geographic regions and therefore there is no hard evidence to substantiate this impression. Nonetheless I feel reasonably confident that it is the case. Even our own District seems to focus less attention on the South Pacific than it does on other areas further distant from Australia.

A total of \$9,159.85 was spent by this club on the following international projects on which I shall also briefly comment:-

Rotary Foundation \$3,160.00
ANZA medical assistance in Indonesia \$2,025.00
Aid for Kosovo refugees\$2,000.00
Water supply for PNG villages
\$1,000.00;

Molly Machingambi \$774.85; Open Heart Mongolia \$200.00.

Paul Harris Fellowships.

The contribution to the Rotary Foundation enabled the club to award two Paul Harris Fellowships during the year. RI announced that it had made a very substantial grant to the International Committee of the Red Cross for the assistance of Kosovo refugees and requested all Rotary clubs to assist by way of direct contributions to the ICRC or by donations via RI. In the latter case contributions earmarked for the ICRC would attract credits for the award of Paul Harris Fellowships. This was the course adopted by the club in making its donation on your behalf of \$2,000.00 to this most worthy cause.

This also involved the use of funds which had been budgeted for the Rotarians Against Malaria program. This, too, I believe to be a very worthwhile program deserving of this club's continued support but the overwhelming humanitarian disaster of Kosovo seemed to vour board to take precedence.

ANZA consists mostly of the wives of expatriates working in Indonesia who carry out charitable work among poor Indonesians. The money was donated to this group at the suggestion of pp John White who had come into contact with the group while staying in Indonesia. The funds were donated specifically to fund operations for the correction of facial disfigurements of five children.

In Indonesia such disfigurements, not only carry with them the effect of the disfigurement itself, but also the exclusion from society altogether of the victim. The carrying out of the operations has because of the disturbances in Indonesia, taken longer than one might have hoped, but all five operations have now been carried out. Before and after photographs are expected soon.

The club received during the year a request from the Rotary Club of Masvingo (Zimbabwe) to support the education of Molly Machingambi for a further 2 years up to university entrance level. We had received very little feed back from the Masvingo club of Molly's progress over preceding years. However, a closer link has now been established as a result of which we learned that she had lost both her parents. We have received a letter from Molly herself and a photograph of her, which was shown to club members. The estimate of the cost of her continued education is US\$1,100. In response US\$500.00 has been remitted to the Masvingo club which should cover

Molly's expenses for calendar year 1999.

\$1,000.00 for water supplies from rural villages in PNG represents the continuation of support for this scheme from the previous year.

\$200.00 for Open Heart Mongolia was a donation in response to a request from District to meet the costs of transport to Sydney and treatment of a Mongolian man whose leg had become gangrenous as the result of injury.

Approximately \$800.00 was not expended from the International Service budget. This was deliberate in order to make funds available for funding more young people to attend Vision Valley. It was judged that the budget adopted for Youth Service earlier in the year had been insufficient.

I have enjoyed my experience as Director International Service and I shall certainly continue to take an interest in this portfolio in the coming year. I hope my successor will find it as interesting and fulfilling as I have.

Achievement

The highlight of Vocational Service was, as usual the Achievement 98 program. Over the weekend nearly every club member played a part and once again there were many comments from attendees on the professional way in which the weekend was conducted. The program contributed a surplus of around \$25,000 to the clubs coffers, a very welcome contribution, but well down on previous years. In spite of refined and sustained marketing the numbers were less than 75% of capacity. This continues a worrying trend that has been noticeable for several years.

The feedback from attendees is however so positive that we remain

convinced that we have a viable program. We do however have to find new ways to market it. A radically redesigned and modernised brochure has been produced for this years efforts and will certainly help to get the attention of prospects. However the "mailer plus telephone follow up" approach will have to be supplemented with more innovative marketing in the years to come.

Mailing has just commenced for this year's program. Good luck to those involved!

Pride of Workmanship

A club Pride of Workmanship evening was held over pending a suggestion from Waitara club that a combined Pride of Workmanship evening be held. We attended a regional meeting in April at which it became clear that the intention was to put on a gala evening with a high profile speaker at which the best candidates from each region would be recognised.
