PRESIDENT'S REPORT

TREASURER'S REPORT

Again the Gordon Markets and the Bobbin Head Cycle Classic were our major Fund Raisers for the year. Income from the Gordon Markets will be \$16,000. Our partnership in BHCC with the Rotary Clubs of St Ives and Turramurra resulted in a distribution of \$82,000 to Lifeline and Bo Hospital. This was an outstanding result for our second year and we expect another significant improvement next year.

The General Account has a closing balance of about \$16,000 when all expenses have been paid. The Project Account will have a closing balance of approximately \$25,000 plus \$23,000 on fixed deposit.

Membership dues have been paid promptly by the majority of our members.

Raising Awareness of TRF

PDG Pam Pritchard gave us an update on the progress of the Polio Plus Program and the key focus areas at the cinema night in February. When Rotary launched Polio Plus in 1985 there were over 350,000 cases of polio each year. During this time the decrease in the number of countries that still suffer from the disease has been extraordinary. India has now been polio free for two years, however it is still endemic in Nigeria, Pakistan and Afghanistan. It is these hard-to-reach areas that are providing the most challenge and the political environment of those areas is also very insecure but Rotary still persists with its immunisation campaigns where it can. Our continued challenge is still the elimination of polio in the remaining countries and maintaining the focus to ensure that it does not reappear in those declared polio free.

Support of the Annual Programs Fund

The members of the Club have contributed approximately \$1,500 to the Annual Programs Fund as part of the Centurion Program, where members can make a tax deductible contribution of \$100 each year. The mission of The Rotary Foundation (TRF) is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, the



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support of education and the alleviation of poverty. The Annual Program Fund is the primary source of funding for the programs of the Foundation and supports Matching Grants, GSE, Ambassadorial Scholarships, etc. It is our own charitable fund and the TRF provides integrity in management of funds – providing hope to millions around the world. Rotary changes the lives of so many people everywhere.

Polio Plus

The Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai continues to support the Polio Plus Program. Our cinema and trivia nights have been the main fundraising activities that support this wonderful program. These events are important as they provide visibility to a greater audience of the work Rotary is doing in the eradication of polio.

The success of these nights has been down to the great organisational skills of Ross and Helen Egan. A big thank-you also goes to friends and members who provided donations for the raffle at the cinema evening in February. It is also important to recognise the contribution from our members and their partners who generously supported the catering requests and brought along their friends to these events. Without you, your family and friends such events would not have been so successful and I am sure we will continue to provide these events during the next Rotary year.

Our Club also continues to provide a donation to the Polio Plus program through the recognition of our Speakers throughout the year and this provides an additional \$1,000 for Polio Plus.

Educational Programs

Rotary runs a number of educational programs and last year we became involved in the Ambassadorial Scholarship Program. This is a program where Rotary Foundation provides access to a number of university scholarships



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throughout the world for successful applicants to study in another country. These scholars are ambassadors not only for the Rotary District and the Club that puts them forward but also their country and it is a wonderful opportunity for the successful applicant. This year we received 3 enquiries however they did not progress past the initial enquiry.

Thank you again to all the members, partners and friends of Rotary Club of Kuring-gai for your support of the Foundation throughout this year.

Finally, Roger thank you for your support and leadership throughout 2012–2013.

Equally important is that all our members constantly invite friends, business associates and others to our meetings, giving them the opportunity to see Rotary in action and to become Rotarians if they would like to. This is vital to achieving our aim of building the membership to 60, so that the club has sufficient human resources to carry out all the things that it needs to.

PUBLIC RELATIONS & BOBBIN HEAD CYCLE CLASSIC

Once again our main PR effort went into the Bobbin Head Cycle Classic – and the results were very pleasing.



Amazingly, we are only in our 2nd year, but had 1700 riders, no serious incidents and raised \$80,000 for our 2 charities, Lifeline and Bo Children's Hospital. This is shaping up to become one of the main Sydney rides and will continue to bring much community recognition to the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai and partner clubs St Ives and Turramurra.

With 1000 riders, the 105K group featured above, was the largest group, continuing the trend from last year. In addition 500 rode the 58K and 200 the 12K. This year the authorities required that we avoid the F3 and map out a new route down Mona Vale Rd. Passing through 4 council areas, several police commands and RMS and National Parks controlled areas, planning this was a big task. Starting at Karuah Oval in Turramurra the 105K and 58K routes traversed Bobbin Head via Hornsby and on to Terrey Hills, where the 58K riders turned for home. The 105K riders continued a tough ride out to West Head.



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The 12K ride followed a completely different route to Jubilee Park Wahroonga, thus separating this family ride from the more ambitious riders, eliminating the congestion of 2012.

Having learnt what worked in 2012 we doubled our marketing effort. Bike shops were found to be a good channel for getting the word out last year so we increased our coverage from 5 council areas to 10, including most of the North Shore and Parramatta. Analysis of our responses clearly shows that this has worked, with riders from the new areas increasing around 100%. Next year we will target 20 municipalities.

We distributed flyers along the course of the Gong Ride and at the Rotary Loop the Lake event. There can't be a better targeted way of getting the word out to cyclists, and with good planning this year we should be able to cover 4 events, giving early notice to 10,000 + riders

We pushed up our banner and trailer sign coverage and had a much more professional PR campaign this year. There can't have been too many riders in Northern Sydney who didn't know about "The Bobbin". In the end more than 40 Rotarians played roles in marketing our event.



Once again our Facebook page and ads did us proud and as shown we now have over 2400 'fans'. We have started to have good 2 way interaction with our rider community and this has been to the benefit of both the riders and ourselves as organizers.

In addition we sent out over 9000

emails, both to encourage last year's riders back and this year's riders to set up a fundraising page for their friends to sponsor them.



Facebook Page

In the end all revenue sources ie rider fees, sponsorship and rider sponsorship trebled a great result. Our Facebook community together with our 1700 participants gives us a great base for kicking off next year's promotion.



However this year's ride was tough and some may not return, so we need to be vigilant and increase the marketing effort for 2014.

We had a few nervous moments before and during the ride, but in the end it was very successful with no major incidents. Many thanks to over 200 Rotarians, partners and friends and Lifeline and Bo for their help as volunteers on the day. So

many Rotarians from all 3 clubs played their part. Our club took lead roles in Web (Bob Ivey), Marketing & Rider Communications (Peter Kipps), Corporate Sponsorship (Graham Timms and Michael Midlam), Registration (Tony McClelland), Site Management (John Aitken), and Logistics (Ross Egan). A noble effort indeed. Many other club members played their part, too many to mention by name.

Last month we held a dinner with Turramurra and St Ives to thank our volunteers and to give LifeLine and Bo Hospital cheques for \$41,000 each. Success indeed.

In 2014 we aim to get 2000+ riders, and double funds from Corporate and Rider Sponsorship to support a total of 4 charities.

School for Life Uganda

This year we joined with Australia's first online club, The Rotary E-club of Greater Sydney, to successfully apply for a Global Grant from The Rotary Foundation. We joined with them to install a solar powered lighting system and a back-up generator. This will mean the school can do much more to serve its community; with evening classes for adults to strengthen the capacity of the whole community to develop income opportunities and move beyond the limits of the past.

Our contribution was just over \$3,000, The E-club \$9,500, and The Rotary Foundation \$27,000.

The need for this vital project never goes away. ShelterBox has now provided shelter warmth and dignity for over a million people affected by natural disasters or conflicts in all parts of the world. This year we again provided funds for two ShelterBoxes (\$2,000). The goal of ShelterBox internationally is to have every Rotary Club donate a box each year. Some, in less fortunate countries, obviously cannot afford to do so. We have a proud record of support for ShelterBox, which I hope we will maintain.

Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children (ROMAC)

ROMAC arranges and manages lifesaving and/or dignity restoring surgery for children from developing countries. This work transforms the lives of the children ROMAC helps by correcting deformities either from birth or caused by accident. ROMAC is often the only hope for people who would otherwise be condemned to a sub-standard life. We gave \$1,000.

Rotarians against Malaria (RAM)

RAM provides bed nets to vulnerable communities. Impregnated bed nets which kill malarial mosquitoes are a very effective way of preventing the spread of this dangerous disease. The RAM Committee is grateful for our continuing support. This programme continues saving lives year after year and we should be proud of our long term contributions. We gave \$1,000.

Bo Hospital

The outstanding project at Bo, Sierra Leone is the biggest international funding project we have been involved with this year but it is covered elsewhere in this report as it was a major beneficiary of the Bobbin Head Cycle Classic.

Interact Club members assisted Caroline and talked to the public about the role of ShelterBox in the international community and the actual contents of the ShelterBox.

Rotaract

I would like our Club to have closer ties with Crosslands and Lower North Shore Rotaract Clubs and it appears the best way to communicate with them is through their Facebook pages. Do we have any volunteers to assist? I have also asked to be put on the list to receive their newsletters.

Youth Insearch

Youth Insearch is a community organisation that focuses on resolving adolescent issues at a peer level. Greg and I met with new CEO, Heath Ducker, and



were impressed by his enthusiasm and plans for the future. Several of our Club members assisted with two working bees and garage sales at their Kurrajong property before it was sold. We also donated funds to help two



young people attend a weekend camp. We hope to be involved with catering for a weekend next year.

Benefic Awards

This is an annual award for one Year 9 student from each of Turramurra, Kuring-gai Creative Arts and Killara High Schools who displays 'a favourable influence' amongst their peers. A perpetual trophy and book voucher were presented to each of the students and my thanks go to Lou, Tom and Malcolm respectively for representing our Club and presenting the awards at Presentation Days/Nights at the end of last year.

Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA)

RYLA is a residential leadership training seminar for 18-25 year olds which is conducted for a week in January each year at Vision Valley and this year we sponsored Karina Barrett. Karina is studying Civil Engineering at UTS and is a Leader of Junior Guides at Cherrybrook. Karina visited our Club before RYLA and also came back afterwards and talked about her RYLA experience. She is keen to know more about Rotaract. Greg, Emyr and I attended the RYLA dinner and enjoyed talking with the other young people attending RYLA and hearing keynote speaker, Kemuel Lam Paktsun , past RYLArian, Rotaractor, now Rotarian and working with Australian Federal Police.

Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA)

This year MUNA was held on March 23 and 24 at Knox Grammar and we sponsored one team from Pymble Ladies College and one team from Killara High School. (PLC funded a second team and Rotary Club of Lindfield sponsored another two teams from Killara.) PLC students represented the Philippines and Malaysia and Killara students represented Kenya, China and Norway. They wore costumes appropriate to their respective countries at the Assembly and debated international issues from their individual country's point of view, including deforestation, climate change, the Arab-Israel conflict



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and Security Council reform. Caroline visited during the weekend and was impressed.

Rotary Youth Driver Awareness (RYDA)

Bob, Malcolm, Nick and past member Brian Jessop assisted with the RYDA program in May when a group of students from Ku-ring-gai Creative Arts High School participated. They were impressed with the program and the way the road safety message was delivered to the students.

Life Education

Street Commodore Car Show



This project came out of nowhere when the Club received a letter from Bubblegum Events asking if our club would like to cater for an event at St Ives Showground. It certainly was not your 'run of the mill' Rotary Project;

however it did appear to be a wonderful opportunity as a fundraiser. We were told by the organisers that they run these events all over Australia and at this show they expected around 200 people for breakfast and 1000 for lunch.

Following a number of phone to validate the projected numbers we set out to cater for these 1000 people. I must say I was more than concerned when there were just a handful of people for breakfast I think our own Members were our biggest Customers?

Then at around 12 midday in rolled the Commodores possibly not 500 however there was an awful lot as the lined up across the showground's main field. Then for the next three hours we served sausage and steak sandwiches, pies, sausage rolls, bacon and egg rolls and drinks lots of drinks. We sold over \$8,200 worth of food which represented about half of what we had catered for.

Fortunately we managed to contact Oz Harvest who rolled up on site to pick up all the food we didn't sell. Oz Harvest distributes all food donations to the soup



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kitchens throughout the city. We were very pleased that Oz Harvest was able to assist. The guys from Oz Harvest described what we had provided as 'gold'.

Gordon Markets

This is our major fundraiser for the Club and requires a roster each month in 3 shifts to set up the markets, manage it through the day and then pack up at the end of the day. Geoff Hungerford, Graham Timms, Frank White, and Wally Forbes and others consistently helped with putting up and taking down the banners and setting up and tidying away. Their commitment has been time consuming and ongoing and much appreciated. Also appreciated was the regular group of helpers on the rosters who reliably met their commitments during the day.

Neringah Hospital

Earlier this year we were approached by Bunning's Thornleigh to assist in the renovation of the old Kiosk at Neringah Hospital Wahroonga. Not to restore as a kiosk but to create a lounge area for visitors when they come to visit their love ones.

The garden that surrounds the 'Kiosk' has been quite beautifully landscaped; our role is to create a lounge area with a coffee machine.

We have already removed all the timber work inside and by the time this Annual Report goes to print we will have removed the brick walls. The next stage will be to patch and make good followed by painting.

Finally we will add new light fittings, floor coverings, a small kitchen and new furniture.



The Lab

The Lab is a Melbourne-based pilot project for 10 to 16 year-old young people with Asperger's Syndrome who enjoy working with computers. It offers one-to-one tuition by technology professionals in areas such as programming, 3D, digital design and gaming. The pilot program has spread from to Melbourne

into Sydney and in partnership with Just BetterCare Pty Ltd has created a sister program in Hornsby.

The proposal is to widen the reach of 'The Lab' and set up multiple branches initially on the north side of Sydney. Over time we would involve other Rotary Clubs and



establish new branches in western and southern Sydney.

We very much look forward to bringing life to the joint project of The Lab and its future expansion.
