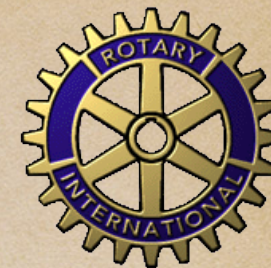


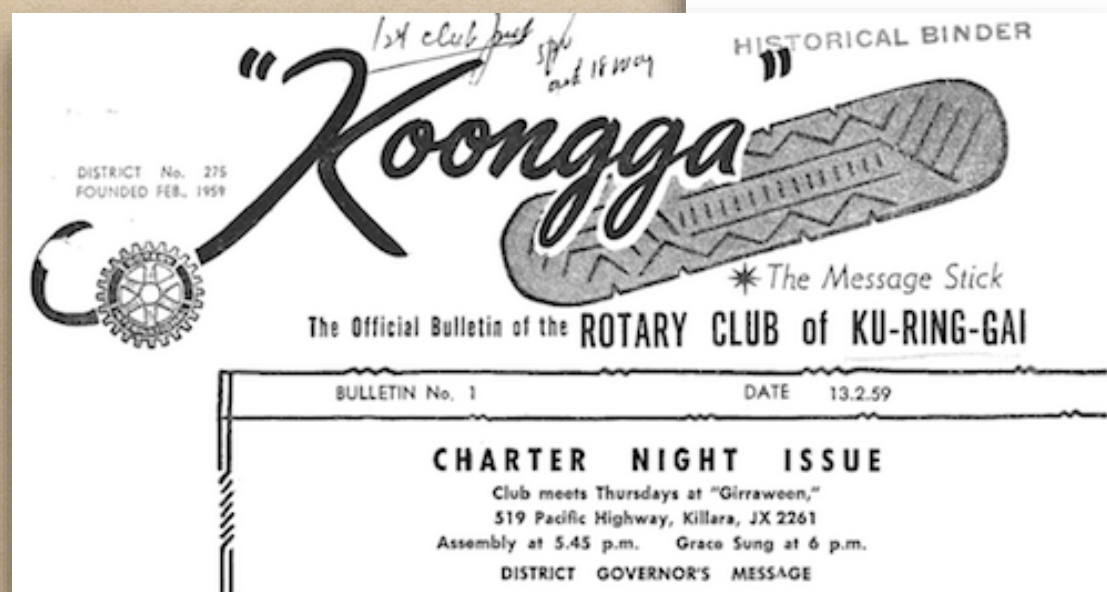

MACMILLAN TO VISIT RUSSIA FOR TALKS THIS MONTH

LONDON, Feb. 5 (A.A.P.). — The Prime Minister, Mr Harold Macmillan, will fly to Moscow on February 21 for a seven to 10-day visit to Russia.

The British Foreign Secretary, Mr Selwyn Lloyd, will accompany the Prime Minister.

The official visit was announced soon after Mr Macmillan and the U.S. Secretary of State, Mr John Foster Dulles, had concluded two days of talks in London.

The visit to the Soviet Union will be the first by a British Prime Minister since the war and the first in peacetime.

Political and Diplomatic circles believe the visit will be in the nature of a "reconnaissance" on behalf of the West to "sound out" Russia on a wide variety of problems.

The official announcement of the visit said: "His principal purpose is to conduct negotiations on behalf of the West... to try to dispel misconceptions and establish some basis for better understanding... The Leader of the Opposition, Mr Hugh Gaitskell, said: 'Macmillan, we hope that our conversation with the Soviet leaders will give them a better knowledge of our views and of our aims...'

Tram Jobs Offered Victoria Seeks Men In N.S.W.

The Melbourne and Metropolitan Tramways Board plans to recruit 200 bus and tram conductors from among the unemployed of N.S.W.

Two officials of the board—the deputy chairman, Mr F. G. Wright, and the staff manager, Mr H. K. Hume—have already investigated emergency work on the N.S.W. southern coastline.

In Sydney last night, Mr Wright and Melbourne had no plans to replace Vauxhall buses.

Mr Wright said his board was looking for men between the ages of 19 and 45 who wanted to make a career in Melbourne.

Pay rates ranged from £14/6 a week for a first-year conductor to £17/10 for a two-year bus driver. Earnings were usually more than this because of extra pay for Saturday, Sun-
