

Notes from President Len's Speech

What are the key challenges for 2006 / 07?

 - b. **Neil Garling** who beavered away mostly behind the scenes and simply managed any function he ran through to completion and a great result . . . Trees of Joy and Bowel Scan. Neil and his lovely wife Judy are away tonight on a Probus tour.
 - c. **Ken Murphy** who is here tonight because his supporting wife Norma is still very ill and disallowed by her doctor from attending tonight. Ken ran the Club Rosters (Markets and Door Team) and handled the attendance recording.
 - d. **Alan Rowe** who finished up a few months ago and who was an absolute wizard with all manner of Signs and 100% dependable with the pre-Market set-up in the district. I'm also going to miss his Stock Exchange tips.

- 2) Having every member of the Club involved with some definitive activity. Ideally with a cross-over / support person so that continuity can be maintained if they are away. Called the 'Buddy System'.
- 3) Finding and doing a 'hands on' initiative this year in the mould of Clarke Road which brought out the very best in us as a team . . . many thanks to David Forsythe. From the newest members to the oldest, everyone seemed to contribute in the best way that they were able. Looking for ideas here.
- 4) To make sure that we understand our situation and opportunities with the Garden Expo so that it starts to really earn its keep. A huge amount of effort has been put into this and there is a strong feeling that the Expo has rounded the corner. Let's finish our analysis first and then make our plans for 2007.
- 5) To capitalize on the new wave of energy from our new Directors and Board members. Finalising our Club Plans and Budgets as soon as possible so as to get the action happening.
- 6) To share the workload. There are so many things that we could and perhaps should be involved with, but everyone is so busy nowadays, more especially those with full-time jobs. My father's comment about being "so busy since he retired that he doesn't know how he ever found time to go to work".
 In line with the idea of everyone being responsible for some facet of our Club, we will see if the work

- 8) A bigger commitment for the Rotary Foundation. Lets see if we can do something every quarter.

9) To have a lot of fun along the way. I've been one of the worst offenders at not making 'fun time' and socials, so I have to learn this more than most. Perhaps a "Manager of Fun" rather than a "Social Events Organiser".

In choosing the activities that your club undertakes, I encourage you to be practical and to remember that a project's success depends much more on the strength of its planning than the scope of its ambition. Continue to identify real needs and address them in an open, cooperative, and sustainable way, not through idealism and wishful thinking but through steady effort and sound knowledge.

I look forward to recognizing your club with the 2006-07 Presidential Citation in recognition of our commitment to Lead the Way to a better future.

The 'Koongga' Message Stick

The Emblem of the Rotary Club Of Ku-ring-gai

It is appropriate that the emblem of the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai should be the *"KOONGGA*", which is a message stick used by the Australian Aboriginals. The pattern of markings burnt into the surface of a *"Koongga"* is not a form of writing. The bearer delivers the message orally and the *"Koongga"* is a guarantee that he is telling the truth.

Bearers of message sticks sometimes travelled long distances, often through the territories of hostile tribes. The messages they delivered were to arrange a corroboree, a trade meeting, exchange of information and other tribal matters.

The colours and symbols on a *"Koongga"* vary with each tribe. The ones chosen by the Rotary Club of Kuring-gai and incorporated into our banner are representative of the tribes that lived in the Ku-ring-gai area many years ago. Additionally, the Banner of the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai bids to all who receive it, a friendly *"Karitandi"*, a friendly welcome. Indeed, the Club's *"Koongga"* and *"Karltandi"* banner reflect in their own unique way, the ideal of "Rotarians united in service, dedicated in Peace".

The Object of Rotary

The object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

First The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

Second High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

Third— The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business and community life;

Fourth— The advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

The Four Way Test of things we say and do

Can be applied profitably in relations with others in the home, community, business, national and international life; particularly to proposed plans, policies, statements and advertising in business and the professions; to proposed legislation in government; to relations between teachers and students in schools.

- Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
- Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned
