Guest Speakers

Lyn Davies as a Rotary Volunteer for the World Community Service (RVWCS), Eastern Region visited East Timor with Grahame Timms recently.

Lyn gave a power point presentation on the trip, which included visits to the sites of a number of rotary projects, including the site of the proposed first RYLA camp in East Timor, planned for September 2010, and a village at which our club is planning a project.

Amina explained that East Timor is a new nation and life is very hard. Many children die through disease. Hot and wet weather bring health problems such as malaria and dysentery.

Life is further complicated by the four languages spoken in the country, including Portuguese, Indonesian and English. There are few English teachers, but it must be learnt by those who wish to be successful.

Dear Rotary Colleagues

The Group Study Exchange (GSE) committee is calling for applications for the position of **GSE Team Leader** for 2011.

In the Rotary year 2010-11, District 9680 will have one GSE Team. Our team will be exchanging with D5830 Texas, USA. The district we are exchanging with is a rural community in NE Texas, Arkansas and Oklahoma. Whilst we would encourage Rotarians with emergency service, educational or media backgrounds to apply, please advise your members that all Rotarians from our District are welcome to apply.

The Exchange period for our outbound team is from 26th March 2011 to 30th April 2011. Team members may wish to take advantage of personal travel at the conclusion of the exchange.

The Group Study Exchange (GSE) program of The Rotary Foundation is a unique cultural and vocational exchange opportunity for young business and professional men and women between the ages of 25 and 40 and in the early years of their professional lives. The program provides travel grants for teams to exchange visits between paired areas in different countries. For four weeks, team members experience the host country's institutions and ways of life, observe their own vocations as practiced abroad, develop personal and professional relationships, and exchange ideas.

For each team member, The Rotary Foundation provides the most economical round-trip air ticket between Sydney and Dallas/Fort Worth (nearest major airport). Local Rotarians in the host district provide for meals, lodging, and group travel within their district. There are some expenses that need to be met by the team members.

Eligibility Criteria

The team leader must:

be an experienced Rotarian and a member of a club in D9680:

not be the current district governor, immediate past district governor, or district governor-elect;

remain with the team for the duration of the exchange;

be willing and able, physically and mentally, to keep pace with the GSE;

not be accompanied by a spouse, companion, or other relatives or dependents during the term of the exchange;

be prepared to serve on the GSE Committee the following year of the exchange.

Several months ago I had a good look at our WEB site


http://www.rotarynews.info/Club4219/r.i and I soon realized it was not useful and obviously no members were using it.

The 'Koongga' Message Stick

The Emblem of the Rotary Club Of Ku-ring-gai

It is appropriate that the emblem of the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai should be the "KOONGGA", which is a message stick used by the Australian Aborigines. The pattern of markings burnt into the surface of a "Koongga" is not a form of writing. The bearer delivers the message orally and the "Koongga" is a guarantee that he is telling the truth.

Bearers of message sticks sometimes travelled long distances, often through the territories of hostile tribes. The messages they delivered were to arrange a corroboree, a trade meeting, exchange of information and other tribal matters



The colours and symbols on a "Koongga" vary with each tribe. The ones chosen by the Rotary Club of Ku-ringgai and incorporated into our banner are representative of the tribes that lived in the Ku-ring-gai area many years ago. Additionally, the Banner of the Rotary club of Ku-ring-gai bids to all who receive it, a friendly "Karltandi", a friendly welcome. Indeed, the Club's "Koongga" and "Karltandi", banner reflect in their own unique way, the ideal of "Rotarians united in service, dedicated in Peace".
