Rotary Foundation Thought for The Week

This week's Rotary Foundation Thought is about Matching Grants. Rotary Clubs in Wisconsin, USA created the Power Flour Action Network to make an impact on the lives of infants and severely malnourished children and adults. Power Flour has targeted malnourished populations in 65 countries to date, providing a very small amount of barley malt flour to cooked starchy staples, such as rice, wheat or maize.

The supplement helps digest the starch, converting it into sugars the body can absorb quickly and easily. The sugars power the body so that it can grow and function. A Matching Grant from The Rotary Foundation has enabled Rotarians in Wisconsin to bring Power Flour to children in orphanages and feeding programs in Panama. Rotarians in the Rotary del Norte club in Panama will carry out the distribution and training in Panama to reach up to 10,000 children in the first year. Members of the Sturgeon Bay, WI, USA club are now working to develop a commercial model for Power Flour so that it will become self-sustaining. Every Rotarian, Every Year -Nourishing bodies and minds.

Clarke Road School

I just want to fill you in on the latest news from Clarke Road Special School. I was honoured a couple of weeks ago when Eleanor asked me if I would like to take her place as the Community Representative on the School Council. I attended my first meeting last Friday, which happened to be the AGM. Their big news is that they are getting a brand new school. All the demountables are going and expenditure has been approved for a new Special School, including 10 classrooms, library, administration, hall, special programs rooms, games court, access roads and car parking etc. Tony Brain, the principal, and his staff are very excited but they realise there is a lot of planning and work to do. Cost is over \$6million with funding through the NSW Dept of Education and Training.

Several members, both staff and parents, on the school council told me how much they appreciated the work our Club has done for the school and how useful the BBQ area is. Before you ask, they don't know yet what will happen with that area in the future as it depends on the "footprint" of the new school.

I said we wanted to keep up our relationship with their school and asked them to let me know if they had another need for some assistance. They desperately need to replace their large school bus which seats about 21. The current one is old, secondhand, leaks badly and is not air conditioned. They have approached Phil McCarroll Toyota but don't know at this stage what the funding situation will be. Two fathers from the school, together with friends and work colleagues, raised over \$27,000 from their City2Surf run for the school and it is possible that will be put towards the bus. I will keep you informed!

The 'Koongga' Message Stick

The Emblem of the Rotary Club Of Ku-ring-gai

It is appropriate that the emblem of the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai should be the "KOONGGA", which is a message stick used by the Australian Aborigines. The pattern of markings burnt into the surface of a "Koongga" is not a form of writing. The bearer delivers the message orally and the "Koongga" is a guarantee that he is telling the truth.

Bearers of message sticks sometimes travelled long distances, often through the territories of hostile tribes. The messages they delivered were to arrange a corroboree, a trade meeting, exchange of information and other tribal matters.



The colours and symbols tribe. The ones chosen

on a "Koongga" vary with each by the Rotary Club of Ku-ring- gai

and incorporated into our banner are representative of the tribes that lived in the Ku-ring-gai area many years ago. Additionally, the Banner of the Rotary club of Ku-ring-gai bids to all who receive it, a friendly "Karltandi", a friendly welcome. Indeed, the Club's "Koongga" and "Karltandi", banner reflect in their own unique way, the ideal of "Rotarians united in service, dedicated in Peace".
