

SheltaBox Article In North Shore Times

FAMILIES whose lives have been torn apart by the devastating floods in Pakistan will receive vital emergency supplies and shelter thanks to the hard work of North Shore Rotary clubs.

The Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai donated \$5000 to fund four ShelterBoxes as part of Rotary's overall bid to help in the relief effort following the worst floods to hit Pakistan in 80 years.

Ku-ring-gai Rotary Club's Linda Lam-Rohlfs said: "The club was happy to do its bit for the millions suffering in Pakistan.

"Given the huge scale of the disaster, every ShelterBox counts and I would urge anyone to get on the Shelter-Box website and donate."

The ShelterBox concept has been a very successful Rotary initiative. Each box contains a tent which can shelter up to 10 people, a stove, blankets, mosquito nets, food storage containers, water purification tools and a tool kit including a shovel, hammer, axe and saw.

The boxes even contain a children's pack of drawing books, crayons and pens. "For children who have lost most, if not all their possessions, these small gifts are treasured," Mrs Lam-Rohlfs said.

Rotary Australia hopes to send out enough Shelter-Boxes to help 6000 families.

Volunteers needed for World Golden Oldies Rugby day

As explained during our telephone conversation I am the Festival Director for the 18th World Golden Oldies Rugby Festival to be held here in Sydney from Sunday 26 September - 3 October.

We are being assisted by Events NSW, but like most major events we are short on the ground for volunteers.

As I explained we are a not for profit organisation and rely on donations, in-kind sponsorship and some funding from the State Government. Our Charity for the 2010 Festival is Ronald McDonald House, where they will raise money through a raffle and fines (simular to Sergeant Fines).

We expect around 5000 players and supporters from 18 countries, and our program requires we have volunteers to assist with our Street Parade in George Street and the three playing days in Centennial Parklands. As a Rotarian I would seek the help of my fellow Rotarians in mounting an event which will stay in the memory of our visitors for a long time on the joys of our "City on the Harbour".

We have parking in Centennial Parklands for our volunteers during the three (3) playing days, and will provide lunch and beverage vouchers. The playing days are Monday 27th September, Wednesday, 29th September and Friday the 1st October.

The Street Parade is on Sunday the 26th September.

Teams will assemble in George Street, between Bathurst and Market Streets from 2.30pm. As the street parade is cantered around the Town Hall our suggestion would be for our volunteers to travel via public transport. The volunteers would be required to ensure the teams are directed to their correction position in the Parade. Following the official opening Teams will commence there march down George Street at 4.30pm, at which time our volunteers can either march with the teams to the Convention Centre or depart the venue.

The Governor, the Premier of New South Wales, and the Lord Mayor will take part in the official Opening Ceremony.

At all occasions we would like to have the volunteers in their Rotary tops so that our visitors would be aware of "Rotary in action".

If you could steer me to the person I should speak to I would be happy to provide them with a full time table and the duties we see our Rotarians fulfilling.

The 'Koongga' Message Stick

The Emblem of the Rotary Club Of Ku-ring-gai

It is appropriate that the emblem of the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai should be the "KOONGGA", which is a message stick used by the Australian Aborigines. The pattern of markings burnt into the surface of a "Koongga" is not a form of writing. The bearer delivers the message orally and the "Koongga" is a guarantee that he is telling the truth.

Bearers of message sticks sometimes travelled long distances, often through the territories of hostile tribes. The messages they delivered were to arrange a corroboree, a trade meeting, exchange of information and other tribal matters.



The colours and symbols on a "Koongga" vary with each tribe. The ones chosen by the Rotary Club of Ku-ring- gai and incorporated into our banner are representative of the tribes that lived in the Ku-ring-gai area many years ago. Additionally, the Banner of the Rotary club of Ku-ring-gai bids to all who receive it, a friendly "Karltandi", a friendly welcome. Indeed, the Club's "Koongga" and "Karltandi", banner reflect in their own unique way, the ideal of "Rotarians united in service, dedicated in Peace".
