# **Next week Speaker Ann Howard**

*"A Ghost, a Murder and Other Dangar Tales"* by Ann Howard

This is a history of this unique island in the Hawkesbury. It covers the early years, the coming of the Eurobeans, the Dangar family in residence, the building of the Hawkesbury River Bridge, subdivision, the world wars and interviews with islanders from the 50s to the present.

Ann, originally from London, has two masters degrees. She has lived in both hemispheres and has travelled extensively - from rock climbing in Tahiti to going on a small ship along the Alaskan coast. Last year in Indonesia, she climbed the lower lava slopes of Anak Krakatoa while it was erupting, and rode elephants through the jungle at Bukit Lawang, after helping bathe them in the Bohorok River.

We welcome her tonight to talk about her 16th book, A Ghost, a Murder & Other Dangar Tales. Les Murray, leading poet and one of the greatest contemporary poets writing in English, wrote to Ann of this book:

'I greatly admire your history of Dangar Island - thanks for it. I've been dipping into it ever since it arrived a day or two ago and I get captivated by all the rich detail. Old Deerubbin, the Hawkesbury, truly is a magical kingdom.'

Apart from her writing, Ann helps children with special needs for the HSC part time and teaches creative writing with U3A at North Sydney. Her list of publications is impressive, including nine short stories published in *Quadrant*. Her special interest is grass roots history. Ann paints in oils and has held successful exhibitions. Ann enjoys all the good things of life, especially her garden on her Dangar Island home, the company of her friends, grandchildren and dogs and a good single malt, not necessarily in that order.

Books can be purchased on the night and be signed by Ann.

# International Night 1st November 2010 6.30 for 7.00pm until 10.00pm

1. Entry charge: \$40/head, no "free entries."

<u>2. Entertainment:</u> Participation in all entertainment inclusive in entry price. The idea is that apart from entry no money is to change hands on the night. Entertainment will be:

(a) Melbourne Cup Sweep - on arrival attendees will draw "blind" a horse or blank. First place will be a case of Toms Waterhole 2007 Shiraz, second place a bottle of Toms Waterhole Vintage Port, third place will be a bottle of Waterhole Blend red or white. Prizes to be available at the next Rotary meeting.

(b) Blind wine tasting - five masked white wines will be available for tasting. Each taster will receive a form and will have to nominate the varieties and regions for marks out of 10. The winner will receive a case of Toms Waterhole 2007 Shiraz. If there is more than one winner the case will be split equally amongst the winners. Prize(s) to be presented on the night

(c) Golf pitching competition - Plastic golf balls to be pitched from the lawn into a target floating in the swimming pool. Those succeeding will win a masked "museum" wine from the Timms cellar to be selected on the night.

(d) McClelland Cycle Classic - Tony McClelland will compete for five minutes with one other club member on an exercise bike. Entrants will be required to nominate the difference in theoretical distance between McClelland's five minutes and his competitors. If the entrant thinks Tony will beat his competitor the distance will be "plus", other wise minus. The winning entrant will be the one who most closely nominates the distance. The prize will be a case of Toms Waterhole 2007 Shiraz. If there is more than one winner the case will be split equally on the night.

<u>4. Food and drink:</u> Red and white wine and water will be supplied. Those attending will need to bring and other drinks including soft drinks, beer, mixers etc.

Food will be supplied by club members. There will be no free entry for food supply **but** the cost of ingredients will be reimbursed if required.

We need at least three more main courses, two starters, salads, desserts and cheeses. Last year Margaret Tang provided an excellent main course and Dilshad Krishnan a superb entrée and the Cribs provided a fruit plate.

5. Infrastructure: We will require at least thirty additional chairs and appropriate tables. Greg Newling can supply 10 stackable chairs and three tables to seat around 15. Bob Ivey can supply two long trestle tables and chairs to seat around 14. To be on the safe side we still need enough tables and chairs for an additional 10 people. These may be available from Ross Egan.

For cooking/food preparation and heating we will have the Timms barbecue and wok burner, hot plate and rice cooker and use of the kitchen plus Tony McClelland's Webber. This should be sufficient.

As for previous years plastic glasses, plates, knives folks and spoons will be provided as well as, this year, tasting glasses for the blind wine tasting.

<u>6. Set up and clean up.</u> In past years we have received assistance from Bob Ivey and Tom Jackson. Both may be available this year in addition to Greg Newling.

## The 'Koongga' Message Stick

## The Emblem of the Rotary Club Of Ku-ring-gai

It is appropriate that the emblem of the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai should be the "KOONGGA", which is a message stick used by the Australian Aborigines. The pattern of markings burnt into the surface of a "Koongga" is not a form of writing. The bearer delivers the message orally and the "Koongga" is a guarantee that he is telling the truth.

Bearers of message sticks sometimes travelled long distances, often through the territories of hostile tribes. The messages they delivered were to arrange a corroboree, a trade meeting, exchange of information and other tribal matters.



The colours and symbols on a "Koongga" vary with each tribe. The ones chosen by the Rotary Club of Ku-ring- gai and incorporated into our banner are representative of the tribes that lived in the Ku-ring-gai area many years ago. Additionally, the Banner of the Rotary club of Ku-ring-gai bids to all who receive it, a friendly "Karltandi", a friendly welcome. Indeed, the Club's "Koongga" and "Karltandi", banner reflect in their own unique way, the ideal of "Rotarians united in service, dedicated in Peace".
