# **Tribute to Tim Philips**

# **Tribute to Tim Philips**



Tim was inducted as a member of the Rotary Club of Kuring-gai in November 1998. His membership classification was 'Hospital Administration'. Part of our club's induction ceremony reads as follows: "Whilst we can make you a member of our Rotary club, we cannot make you a Rotar-

ian. That is an honour which you must gain for yourself. The community will know you, and will judge Rotary, by your commitment to the ideal of "Service Above Self".

Well, Tim became an exemplary Rotarian. Looking back, the extent and range of his involvement in our club's activities is extraordinary.

He served on the following committees:

Club Service, which is concerned with administration of the club;

Community Service – carrying out projects for the benefit of the local community;

Vocational Service – promoting high standards in all areas of work;

International Service – supporting projects in the developing world;

New initiatives – a special committee set up to develop new projects for the club after our previous major annual project ceased to be viable; and

The Ku-ring-gai Garden Festival – our club's current major annual project.

Tim also took responsibility for, amongst other things:

Arranging guest speakers, which is a vital part of successful club meetings and a very demanding role; and

Publicity – how the club presents itself to and communicates with the community.

Tim joined the club board in 2000 and was very active as a director in charge of some of the areas I've just mentioned.

In 2005 the club revived the role of Vice President, which had fallen into disuse. Tim was elected to the position and served with distinction from 2005 – 08, setting the standard for others to follow.

Much of the time Tim was a quiet achiever, beavering away in the background, getting things done. He was always willing to do whatever he could. And when he undertook a task, you knew that he would complete it and do it thoroughly.

He is particularly remembered for his major contribution towards the establishment of the Ku-ring-gai Garden Festival. Past President Ross Egan, who was chairman of the organizing committee, described Tim as "a mainstay of the start of the Festival". He was our principal liaison with Ku-ring-gai Council and negotiated many of the arrangements which are fundamental to the success of the Festival. In addition, he personally secured a lot of the stallholders, without whom the Festival could not have been held.

But Tim didn't just hide in the background. He was always an active participant in discussions at club and board meetings. He had strong views and he made them known. And we appreciated his commercial common sense, derived from his years of experience as chief executive officer. Our presidents in particular valued his assistance as a sounding board for ideas.

One part of the object of Rotary is 'the development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service'. Rotarians call this 'fellowship' and it's at the foundation of everything we do. Tim was always good company, a good listener and a thoughtful contributor to discussion. We particular admired him for the way that, in recent years, he determinedly maintained his attendance at – and his participation in – our club meetings. Despite his illness (about which he never complained) he'd always be there, listening carefully to debate or to the guest speaker and contributing with apposite comments and searching questions.

In summary, our club is proud to have had Tim as a member and as an outstanding Rotarian. He richly deserved the recognition as a Paul Harris Fellow which was awarded to him in 2007.

I'd also like to pay tribute to Sharna for her dedicated care of Tim, especially during the past year, when she went out of her way to drive him to and from club meetings. I know that Tim really appreciated being able to attend and we were very glad that he could still join us. Sharna, as you know, Rotarians' partners are all part of the Rotary family. We've enjoyed your participation and hope that you'll maintain your association with the club in years to come.

In 2005 the RI Board of Directors created a new type of Rotary entity called Rotarian Action Groups. Rotarian Action Groups are groups of Rotarians, Rotarian spouses, and Rotaractors who join together to conduct projects in a particular area of service. Each Rotarian Action Group is officially recognized by the Board, but functions independently of Rotary International, with its own governance and administrative structure. There are currently 14 recognized Rotarian Action Groups, which have a combined membership of over 27,000 people in more than 100 countries worldwide. These 14 groups address the following issues:

- AIDS
- Blindness Prevention
- Blood Donation
- Dental Volunteers
- Diabetes
- Disaster Relief
- Health Fairs
- Hunger and Malnutrition
- Malaria
- Microcredit
- Multiple Sclerosis
- Polio Survivors
- Population and Development
- Water and Sanitation

To learn more about these groups and the projects that they have been undertaking recently, please download the 2009-10 Rotarian Action Groups Annual Report.

Recognizing that Rotarian Action Groups possess valuable expertise in their areas of specialty and capacity to help clubs and districts plan and implement effective service projects, the Board encourages these groups to contact district governors and offer their assistance to Rotary clubs. Rotarian Action Groups may only contact clubs when the district governor grants express permission to do so. If approached by a Rotarian Action Group, you are free to use your discretion in deciding whether to allow the group to make contact with your clubs. If permission is granted, it will be incumbent on the group to renew its communication privileges with the incoming governor for the next Rotary year, and so on thereafter.

By collaborating with Rotarian Action Groups, clubs and districts can enhance the scope and impact of their humanitarian service projects, improve Rotary's public image and awareness, and attract and retain members who are motivated by involvement in service. I hope that you will favourably consider opportunities to collaborate with these groups and benefit from their talents and enthusiasm.

# **Paul Harris Friendship Trees**

Paul Harris the founder of Rotary, with his wife Jean, toured all cities of Australia in 1935. He planted a tree in Melbourne, saying:

"...Many good will trees have been planted by Rotarians, including myself, in other cities in other countries, and many more doubtless will be planted, but the first of them all was Walter's tree." Paul P. Harris.

He was referring to Australian Walter Drummond who, after a visit to the Rotary Club of Chicago in December 1913, twice visited the Harrises at their home in Comely Bank to find out about starting Rotary in his own country, but it was not until the end of the war in Europe that this was done. Drummond later became the second secretary of the Melbourne Club. He died young and it was to his memory that Paul Harris planted the first tree in his goodwill garden at Comely Bank.

Paul Harris planted trees in many other cities around the world.

We now have two models of Club shirt in member circulation; the original Navy Polo with red (or white) piping/gold (Photo attached) and


• the Chambray business shirt (photo attached).
