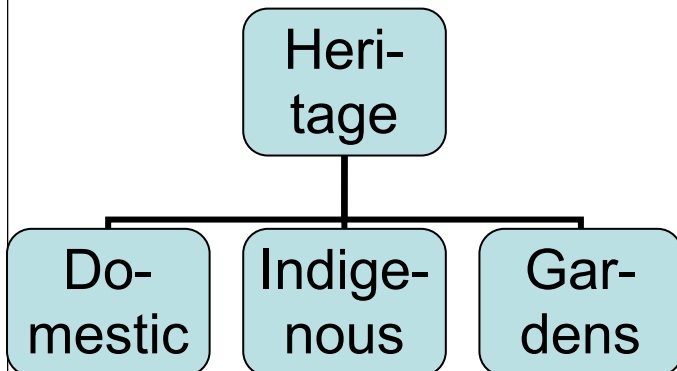

To properly recognise our rich history and to ensure therefore ongoing protection from significant change, Ku-ring-gai Council has undertaken a process of assessment to identify potential heritage conservation areas (HCAs) throughout the community.

Ku-ring-gai is a rare blend



The Heritage Conservation Areas Review relates to our rich history of Domestic Architecture and Streetscapes of residential areas of notable heritage importance

What is a Heritage Conservation Area (HCA)?

HCA is an area valued by the community for its history and aesthetics. It contains a number of elements of heritage significance which combine to create a sense of place that is unique to Ku-ring-gai..

Heritage Significance may include:

- Historic subdivisions
- A pattern of building footprints
- Buildings of historical importance
- Buildings of architectural importance
- Trees,
- Gardens,
- Gutters and kerb edges
- Road alignments
- Items of social significance
- Items of technical significance

- Cavity walls
- Marseilles tiles
- Innovative landscape designs – Edna Wallings, Paul Sorenson & Jocelyn Brown

How do we identify potential Heritage Conservation Areas (HCAs)?

- Third party consultants were engaged independently to review and assess prospective HCAs as originally identified by the National Trust.

- Across Ku-ring-gai 45 HCAs have been recommended to Council. The proposed areas are displayed in the draft heritage map and report currently on public exhibition for review and comment.

- If the proposed HCAs are adopted by an Ordinary Meeting of Council, they will form part of the Principal Local Environmental Plan (LEP).

What did Consultants look for?

- Consistent character in a street or group of streets
- Consistent and intact tree planting and/or front gardens
- Significant number of contributory houses from any of the architectural periods in Ku-ring-gai's history
- An area with a significant number of individual heritage items

Can I make alterations to a building in a Heritage Conservation Area?

A: Yes, alterations can be made.

- Because of the variety and quality of buildings in Ku-ring-gai, heritage items are managed on a merit basis.
- Specific guidelines have been developed for HCAs to ensure that new development retains the identified historic and aesthetic character of the HCA.

What changes can I make in a Heritage Conservation Area?

Council has the ability to approve a wide range of works to a property in an HCA including:

- Subdivision
- Change of Use
- Alterations and Additions

Key Considerations when applying to alter or add to a property in an HCA

- Setting back the works from the existing structure.
- Creating a clear visual break (eg an expansion joint, recess, or a full height opening).

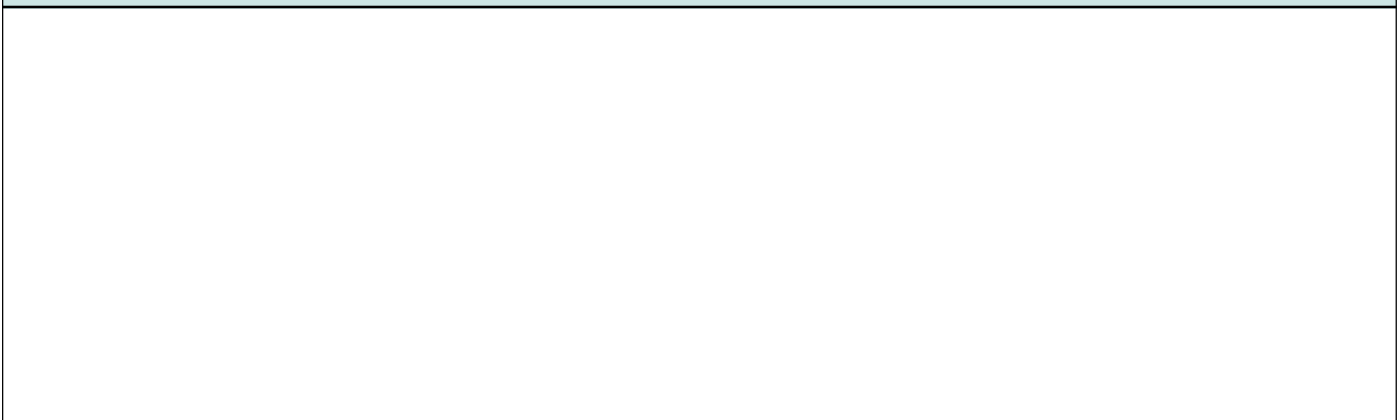
Rotary Foundation Thought for The Week

Rotary launched its PolioPlus program in 1985 and contributions to the PolioPlus Fund continue to support the most essential components of polio eradication activities in our partnership with the World Health Organisation (WHO), the US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and UNICEF. With Rotary's community-based network worldwide, Rotary is the volunteer arm of the global partnership dedicated to eradicating polio.

At the end of 2010 Rotarians have donated US\$160 million to the Rotary \$200 million Challenge which will be matched by The Gates Foundation and along with The Gate's additional \$155 million, donations will total \$555 million by July 2012.
