Guest Speaker ABC and Rice Tess McLean

Good evening everyone,

My name is Tess McLean and I am here tonight to talk to you about a school in Siem Reap, Cambodia called ABC's & Rice. I recently spent two months volunteer teaching at this amazing school, and since coming home have been determined to find ways to continue to support this school in the long term. I thought I would start off tonight, by showing a photo slideshow of my experiences at ABC's & Rice.

Why did I go there? I am a qualified teacher. I attended Brigidine college in St Ives and then graduated from Macquarie university in 2008. I then worked full time at Castle Cove Public School. After 18 months I decided it was time for me to go overseas, as the main reason I became a teacher was to be able to travel, work and volunteer in different countries around the world. Cambodia appealed to me because it was not too far from home, yet it is among the poorest countries in the world. I then researched a number of volunteer organisations and decided to volunteer through an agency called 'Globalteer.'

What is 'Globalteer'? Globalteer is a UK registered non profit charity that provides volunteer placements working with children in Cambodia, and it supports projects and communities around the world. In Siem Reap, Cambodia, Globalteer supports free education programmes for children, homes for orphans and vulnerable children, vocational training, day centres for street kids, sports, arts and the community as a whole. When you volunteer through Globalteer, you make a donation upfront. This donation pays for your accommodation, but the majority of it goes towards the project you will be working at. So, the individual skills of volunteers, as well as their financial donations enable the projects to exist and expand.

What is ABC's & Rice? ABC's & Rice is one of the free education projects that Globalteer supports, and it is where I was sent to do my volunteer teaching. It is a small school that was opened by a Canadian woman, Tammy Durand, who was travelling in Cambodia and saw the desperate need for a free school in the area. ABC's & Rice is situated in Veal Village, which is about ten minutes out of main Siem Reap. Most of the fathers in this village fought as soldiers against the Khmer Rouge, they are missing arms and legs, and are unable to work or earn much money for their families. As a result, most of the small children were being sent out to the streets of Siem Reap at night, to beg tourists for money. The children weren't going to the local public school, as the families could not afford the uniforms, books, pencils and teacher bribes that were required.

In an effort to get these children off the streets and into a classroom, Tammy, with the support of Globalteer, started a rice program as a reverse tuition. This means that they encourage the poorest of children to attend the school as opposed to going out and earning enough money to eat. In return, they provide rice and seasonings to families on a monthly basis. This gains the support of the local families, and also relieves the need for the children to be out working. The families understand that the rice and seasonings are ONLY given to them if

their children are attending school each day, and sleeping each night. This rice program is one of the main reasons that the school is a success, as it means that all the local families support the school and send their children there everyday. The school also runs a breakfast program, where the poorest students can come before school and be given a free meal.

ABC's & Rice is a FREE school with four classes run by 4 young Cambodian teachers. The students ages range from 4 years-16 years. The youngest class of 4 year olds is the newest addition, as all of the older children were bringing their young siblings along with them to school. The Cambodian teachers are young, enthusiastic and keen to develop professionally. They teach both English and Khmer to the children, and enjoy the opportunity to work with and learn from different volunteers.

What was the school like?

When I was at the school in September/October last year, it was very basic. It consisted of five small bamboo huts with tin rooves. One squat toilet. One water pump (that we could not drink out of). In each classroom there were wooden desks, long wooden seats and a small whiteboard. In my time volunteering, I realised just how difficult it was for the kids to work in these conditions. When it was sunny, it was unbearably hot in the classrooms. When it rained (which was a lot), the rain came through the roof, the floor became mud, and everything had to be packed away so it didn't get wet. We could not keep any books or resources in the classrooms as they were not secure.

Recent developments:

Since I was at the school, Tammy and other volunteers have worked hard to raise enough money to build three permanent concrete classrooms. Each classroom costs about \$4500. Over the Christmas break, I worked hard to raise money to assist in the building of these concrete classrooms. There is currently a construction team of volunteers at the school building these. They have also just bought the land next to the school, so they are ready to grow and build more classrooms and a bigger play area.

How could you help?

Obviously as ABC's & Rice is a new and developing school, there are lots of fundraising opportunities.

One off donations:

The school would benefit enormously from donations to help in the construction of:

two more permanent classrooms

- a bathroom station
- a new kitchen for the breakfast club
- a new well for the school

Ongoing support:

If you are looking for a project to support over a longer period of time, ABC's & Rice would be the perfect project. I have been emailing Tammy Durand and she had some fantastic ideas about what areas of the school you could support long term:

One idea was to support a classroom. This could include the teacher's wages and training, books for that class, new whiteboard and other materials, plus a

percentage of the electricity bill. This way you could be updated regularly about your particular classroom, and you would know exactly what your donations would be going towards.

Another idea was the expansion of the breakfast club. Currently this club only provides breakfast to the poorest students, but there are still many students who come to school hungry and don't have a proper meal all day. This has ongoing costs such as kitchen appliances, food, and wages for a cook.

You could also choose to support the rice program.

This is where they provide rice and seasonings to local families, to relieve the children from having to work and beg.

How would this work?

Unfortunately ABC's & Rice do not have their NGO status yet. The Cambodian government has not made things easy for them, and their application is taking time. For that reason, the school doesn't have a bank account, and they don't receive donations directly from anyone.

Globalteer runs a bank account for ABC's & Rice. Tammy can ask for money whenever she wants it, and the sum keeps going up as more volunteers come and people make donations. Ashlee Chapman, who runs Globalteer in Siem Reap, has advised me that ABC's & Rice is very careful with their money. They want to ensure the longevity of the project. Whilst other projects spend as much money as they have coming in, Tammy keeps most of the money in the bank to ensure they can continually pay wages, buy rice etc. Due to Tammy's fantastic leadership, and Globalteer's support, many volunteers and donors have faith that this project will be long lasting and successful.

Therefore if you decided to support ABC's & Rice, donations could be sent to the school through Globalteer. Ashlee Chapman, as the manager of Globalteer, is happy to oversee the account and ensure that money is being used properly. Tammy Durand can then keep us updated about what each donation is being used for. All donations would go directly to the school.

Caroline and Graham mentioned that donations could also be sent through a rotary club in Siem Reap. Ashlee Chapman from Globalteer, would be more than happy to work closely with a rotary club over in Cambodia. This rotary club could see first hand how the money is being spent at ABC's & Rice. It could be very positive to build up a relationship between Globalteer and Rotary over in Siem Reap. Globalteer's ultimate goal is to build up projects so that eventually they no longer need support, but there will always be a new grassroots project looking for support.

Why is it worthwhile?

As a teacher I have spent a lot of time with young kids. The young kids at ABC's & Rice had a huge impact on me as despite being poor, hungry and disadvantaged, they were some of the happiest and most appreciative children I have ever met. They really loved being at school and appreciated the opportunity to learn.

In my time at the school it became so clear to me that what is so little to us, can forever change the life of a child in Cambodia. That is why I want to help ABC's & Rice in their aim to make a huge impact on a small village. As the ABC's & Rice motto says:

"Be the change you want see in the world."
