Information propagation in fibres

•Electrical signal (computer, telephone etc) is 'replicated' on an optical carrier using wellestablished modulation techniques

•Converted back into electrical signals at the other end.

•Optical carrier frequency ~ 200 terahertz so fibre capacity is many terabits per second
