Caroline Jones Guest Speaker

As an editor and literary historian, I'm fascinated and possibly a little biased about how a publishing house can manufacture national myths and legends through the careful selection of authors and the subtle manipulation of their manuscripts. To illustrate this theme, I'm going to focus on the publisher George Robertson of Angus & Robertson and how his editorial instructions to Charles Bean and Henry Lawson changed our idea of Australian mateship and egalitarianism.

Bean's insistence on copious detail rather than grand epic style initially horrified his publisher because it lacked the dignity which befitted a maturing colonial nation. Robertson also thought that Bean's information on the home front volunteer effort was too pedestrian and inappropriate for the beginning of a national history. After reading an early draft, Robertson complained to Arthur Jose that Bean was 'what our dear friend Henry Lawson calls "a Wanterwriteandcant".' Bean set about recasting the beginning of volume one and writing an introduction to it; but even his rewrite didn't gel with George Robertson's idea of what an official history should entail:

Of the philosophy of history Mr. Bean could write all he knows on the back of a postage stamp: and, as I say, his narrative is a tangle.

It is admitted that the Australians can <u>fight</u> — why not show the world that they can <u>write</u>?

George Robertson firmly believed that Bean's manuscript needed to be rescued from parochialism and concentration on the everyday, and lifted to a higher literary level. Yet, in forcing Bean to mould the introduction into a grand narrative, quite by accident George Robertson encouraged women to be excluded from Bean's description of Australian character because most of the domestic topics Bean originally covered in his first chapter were cut out and written about in volume eleven on the home front.

Women's exclusion from volume one was compounded by the fact that nurses, although stationed in France and Egypt, didn't set foot at Anzac Cove since hospital ships were safely anchored offshore during the Gallipoli campaign. With little mention of the home front in the introduction and early chapters and the rest of the first volume concentrating on Gallipoli, the Anzac legend and its emphasis on Australian male mateship became entrenched in national mythology as the ideal Australian stereotype.

Henry Lawson was another Angus & Robertson author who initially included everywoman in his work but who is remembered, even lionised, for writing about every man. Lawson and his wife briefly lived in New Zealand at the time women got the vote. During this era, he published a poem titled 'For'ard' about ship life and the conditions steerage passengers faced compared to those in first class. In this poem, Lawson empowered women (and men) with the ability to create a new world order:

But the curse o' class distinctions from our shoulders shall be hurl'd,

An' the influence of women revolutionise the world

...

An' there won't be any friction 'twixt the classes fore an' aft.

We'll be brothers, fore an' aft! Yes, an' sisters, fore an' aft!

As George Robertson was putting together an English edition of his poet's verse, Henry Lawson suggested that the phrase 'influence of kindness' should replace 'influence of women' or 'woman' in this important line. One of the firm's editors, David McKee Wright, later altered this suggestion to read 'the sense of Human Kinship'. When coupled with other poems, such as 'The Shearers', the focus of Lawson's poetry retrospectively became entrenched as egalitarian, masculine and democratically nationalistic, whereas originally he had written that women themselves could make a difference.

The kind of narrative that is written depends upon the publisher's and editor's agenda and the author they choose to tell their story. The Official History of Australia in the War of 1914–18 and Lawson's poetry are remarkable bodies of work of which Angus & Robertson and indeed Australia can be proud. Crystallisation of the Anzac male legend and Australian egalitarianism are as revered on Anzac Day in the twenty-first century as when these texts were first written. Yet, whilst honouring these iconic authors, it is important to remember that a completely different narrative and set of Australian myths and legends could have been celebrated today if other editors and publishers had worked on Lawson's selected poetry and the history of Australia during the Great War.
