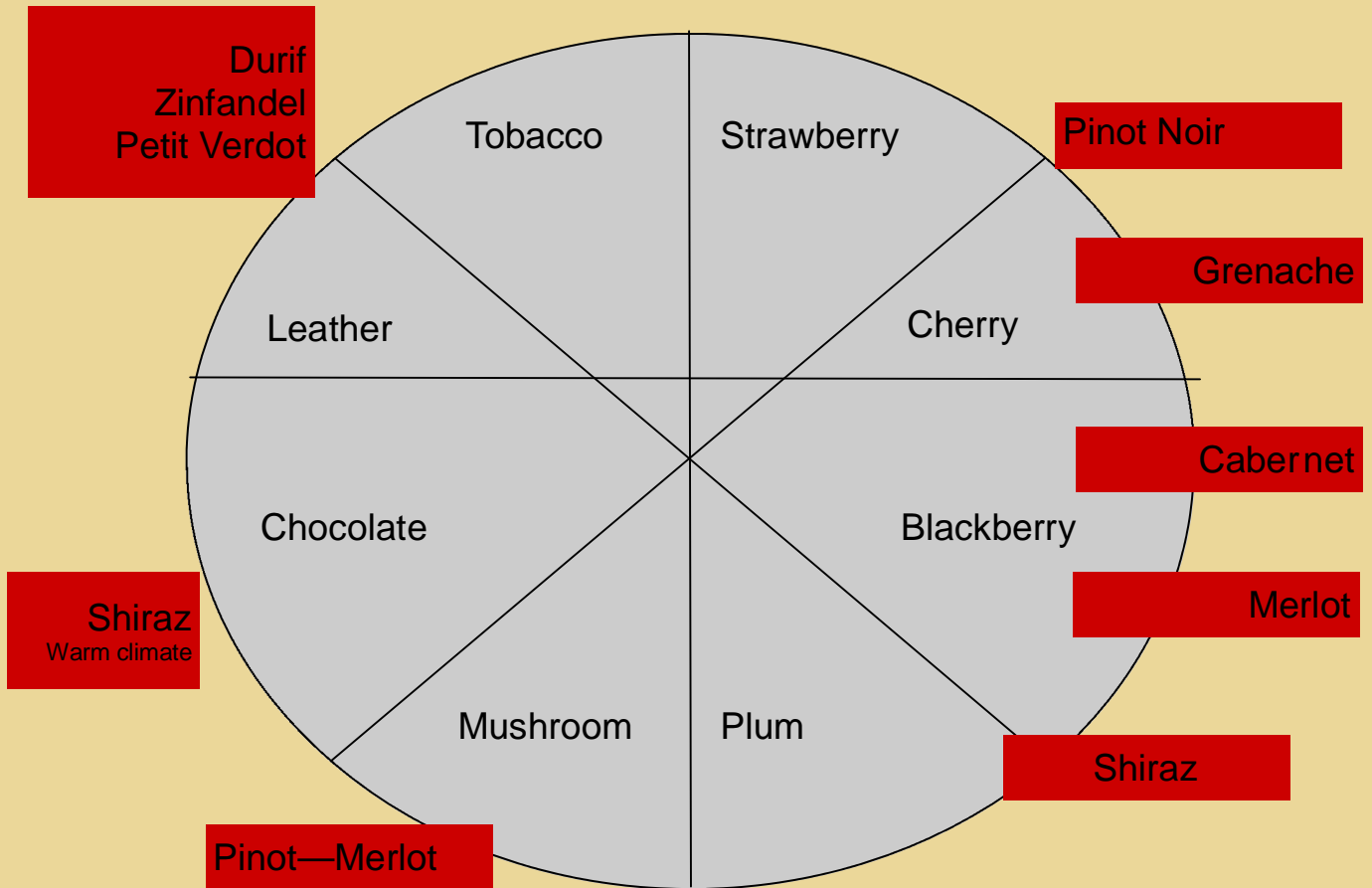

2011/12 Membership Drive

Membership Director Michael Tyler made a presentation with the following key points:

The club is having a year-long membership drive. The club's strategic plan – agreed to by all of you – seeks a membership of 60 to enable the club to undertake larger projects.

Each of you is responsible for inviting potential Rotarians to the club.

The success of the membership drive will depend on active involvement by each of you. The membership committee won't accept responsibility if the club gets no new members.

The club will hold Rotary Awareness Nights on Monday, 10 October and Monday, 16 April. The aims will be for each of you to bring at least one potential member and to at least double our attendance on each of those nights.

The aim is to use a structured approach, based on a system to target particular categories of people.

Each of you has his/her own personalised copy of a business classifications list. You should **KEEP IT and BRING IT EACH WEEK**. It's an eclectic list – not a closed list of classifications. You should use it as a prompt to think of other classifications.

The only qualifications for a potential Rotarian are that he/she is a person:

1. Of goodwill who wants to do something for the community;
 2. Who lives and/or works locally; and
 3. Who is already known to you and with whom you have already had dealings in some way.
- You can invite people whose business classifications are already represented in the club.
 - Each week, Michael will suggest a few key business types you may know. This week: architect, baker, builder, butcher, carpenter/joiner.
 - Each week, Michael will suggest a group of people you do know. This week: your relatives and friends.
 - You should write down the names of qualified people they know in each business category. You should also invite your partners to do the same.
 - You should then invite those people to a club meeting. You need not be nervous. You will be doing the invitees a favour. They'll be flattered to be invited.

Michael Tyler Membership Drive

- You should invite potential members to a club meeting straight away, without waiting for a Rotary Awareness Night (but should invite them to that too).
- You should follow up each invitation 1 week before & on the day of the meeting.
- On 19 September there will be a 'Who do you know?' session to see what progress is being made. Then or subsequently, the membership committee will collect all the members' forms, containing the names of their invitees.

Rotary Foundation Thoughts

7) This week's Rotary Foundation Thought is about Matching Grants.

Syahrul Gunawan looked in the mirror and touched the reflection of his nose and lips. The seven-year-old boy, who had received surgery for clefts on both sides of his upper lip, smiled at his mother and exclaimed how handsome he was. Thalca Hamid from the Rotary Club of Surabaya Central, Indonesia, recalls how the boy's mother told Hamid she had given her son a normal life.

"At times I feel like crying when I hear about these children," Hamid says, *"because friendships from all over the world can change a child's life."*

Gunawan was among the first children in 2001 who received cleft lip or palate surgeries through the efforts of Hamid and the Surabaya Central club. Since then, 2,000 children have undergone surgery with help from Australian, Dutch, and Indonesian Rotarians.

Two Matching Grants have aided this effort, the most recent of which was cosponsored by District 1610 (The Netherlands). This second, US\$45,000 project provided surgeries to 149 impoverished children in 2006-07.

Fast facts:

Cleft lip and/or palate is the most common facial birth defect, affecting one in 700 babies worldwide and one in 500 in Asia.

Cleft lip and palate defects can interfere with eating, speaking, and breathing and can cause dental problems, ear infections, and hearing loss.

A cleft lip can range from a notch in the upper lip to a larger split extending into the nose.

A cleft palate is an opening in the roof of the mouth ranging from a small malformation to a large separation of the palate.

Babies can be born with both a cleft lip and palate or just a cleft in one area.

The ideal age to receive corrective surgery is between 10 and 12 weeks for cleft lip and between 9 and 18 months for cleft palate.
