Letter to Editor Ivan Cribb

Sir

The membership evening last Monday was undoubtedly a great social success and all those responsible for it organization deserve hearty congratulations. Awareness Night





Guest Speaker—Patrick Haynes



In 1959 Pat went to the Antarctic where he remained for 2 years. When departing he decided to get off the return boat at Chile and by chance met the headmaster of a boys school and he decided to become a housemaster. He stayed for 3 years.

He later returned to the Antarctic as a cook They needed to survey mountains 120 miles away. Pat volunteers, he was put in charge of 60 dogs and all the sledging systems. They set off in September in 1965, when they departed the temperature was minus 40 and they slept in tents. They had 3 tractors and the dog teams to work in the mountains. With 9 dogs in a team the logistics were formidable and the snow mobiles eventually took over from the dogs in later years. Six members stayed out for the summer. When they reached the destination they made a depot. There was an accident and they lost one tractor and three men. Only two people were prepared to remain on the job and Pat was one of those. The radio communication was very poor but they got approval to remain as a 2 man team to carry on with the survey work with one dog team. The dogs are wonderful and very forgiving and work until they drop. When they fight they really mean it and any fight needs to be stopped very quickly. They were fed each night and they slept outside At the beginning they had to relay up a slope and this took 2 runs up and on the return journey a blizzard started, they quickly made camp and waited for the blizzard to stop, this took 8 days. They had no books or radio and they just had to sit and wait it out. You cannot always see a crevasse, one person would lead with an ice pick hitting the surface and then peg the safer route, At Christmas they needed to return to the depot and they travelled at night (24 hours light) and they went to the main depot, set up a tent, put on

They needed to return to the bad terrain and discovered they went over the bad surface without knowing, luckily they did not fall down a crevasse. New years day was overcast and they listened to the progress of the New Year each hour around the world. When they returned to go home they missed some of the pegs and went on half rations but eventually found the markers and were able to return. At the edge the Antarctic terrain is very broken

clean clothes (the first clothing change since Septem-

ber).

Rotary Foundation Thought of the week

41) This week's Rotary Foundation Thought is about Changing and Saving Lives.

Have you ever considered that your contribution to The Rotary Foundation may mean the difference between life and death? In Lima, Peru, more than 70 percent of the drinking water comes from the Rimac River, which is polluted with high levels of cadmium, copper, lead, zinc, and arsenic. To help alleviate that problem, The Rotary Foundation and its partners have supplied water filters to 5,000 families living along the river. "They are not just giving us a concrete box," says Maria Moron, one of the recipients of a filter. "They are giving us health, and our children a better quality of life."

Closer to home, the Rotary Club of Glenhaven facilitated a District Simplified Grant and with the support of a number of D9680 Rotary Clubs supplied 400 water microfilters to the Rotary Club of Ban Paew D3330 Thailand. The filters along with suitable attachments for taps and buckets were distributed to the local population served by the Ban Paew Club, thus supplying clean safe water to those families affected by floods that only had access to contaminated water. The area is 80 kms North of Bangkok.

Rotarian's contributions to these projects have literally meant the difference between life and death for many of the children in these areas.

These are just two examples of how Rotarians are helping to improve access to clean drinking water and adequate sanitation around the globe.
