

FIIG SECURITIES TO SPON-SOR CYCLE CLASSIC



Fixed Income Specialists

The Bobbin Head Cycle Classic Committee announced on Friday that FIIG Securities has agreed to become the leading and "name" sponsor for the 2013 event. They have also taken up an option over the event for the next three years.

FIIG was established in 1998 but until 2010 dealt almost exclusively with very high net worth individuals. Emyr Evans 10 on me



I spoke briefly about my voluntary work in Norwich before I came to live in Sydney. I'd been a prison visitor which meant I had was allocated a prisoner for one hour each week. Rules were that all conversation between the prisoner and me remained confidential unless there was a threat to the welfare of the prisoner and if there was an escape risk. Norwich Prison is a remand prison where prisoners awaited sentencing – porridge in Norwich! The most harrowing situation was where inmates strongly disapproved of the crime committed by one of the prisoners and as a result they pushed burning newspapers under his cell door which led to the inmate suiciding.

I'd also been a Samaritan (Lifeline here in Australia) which again periodically involved dealing with potential suicide cases. Some telephone callers of course just needed to speak with someone.

When I came to Sydney and tracked down the NSW Volunteer organisation I discovered the huge breadth of volunteering, for example, from parents who helped with sports on Saturday mornings to organizations that helped to raised money for heart foundation and all the support that Rotary provided for Cancer Council and similar organisations. I've been a Rotarian since 1985 so I'm aware what the Rotary organisation is capable of high achieving and wanted to maintain my involvement.

But I felt that I should busy himself in my early 60's where I could use my experience as a musician so when I heard that a classical music radio station (then 2MBSFM and now Fine Music 102.5) was looking for volunteers I thought that this was for me.

'What would you like to be involved with' asked the interviewing volunteer co-ordinator 'Well I remember when I was about 7 and sitting in the bath at home and my mother had asked me what I'd like to be when I grew up I said I'd like to be a radio announcer. Don't ask me why'?

'So here am I having spent over ten years one way and another preparing programmes, broadcasting those programmes, been on the Board, and trained people to be presenters'.

I then went on to speak about the new premises, the expansion in the work force, the generous bequests which have led to all kinds of initiatives and particularly to the continuation of the fine work that Fine Music 102.5 fulfils.

It's very exciting rewarding work, meeting lots of like minded people and what can I tell you about the work there – all voluntary of course.

It's an organisation which has some 5/6 salaried people. Lots of volunteers who do anything from distributing the Guide to preparing programmes, broadcasting, making sure the Radio Station is put out to air.

Emyr then distributed programme guides and subscriber forms.

The most common type of Cyber crime is Identity theft.

 Take great care of your driver licence •With your name, address & DOB, the bad guys may use your identity for a loan or credit card

oYour Driver Licence

- o Bank Statement
- o Your Passport / Tax File No.
- Your mailbox outside the house

Spear Phishing - targeted tricks to get your password, or plant the spying software in your PC. Whaling - targeted senior executives for stealing information from the PC.

Attempting to acquire information such as User Name, Password and Credit Card details by masquerading as a trustworthy entity through a personalised email or Skype or Web page.

o Take control of your Internet footprint. Just don't click it

 You can be infected through Phishing, Web page or email message

•Free downloads can be deadly.....

•When you take your USB to the photo shop for printing the photos, do not use it onto your PC without scanning for virus.

•Do not share your USB with someone you don't know. •Do not pick up the USB from public places.

Password protection

O Do not store your password in Outlook (the M/S Email system)

o Do not write it down on a piece of paper and stick it up next to your PC.

o Do not use short password (i.e. 1234)

o Avoid using the words that you can find in Dictionary. o Change it regularly.



When a bid for a horse is successful, the money for that horse goes into the pool.


The owner of a 1st, 2nd or 3rd place getter wins a percentage of the pool.
