

Katuuso School & Vocational project

update:

Construction:

We have recently finished roofing and are onto the brickwork on the extension of stage 2 which consists of one classroom, the library, and a small outdoor shade area.

The 3rd and final section of the school is now at foundation level while we fabricate the supports and trusses. We hope to have this completed within the next three weeks and then we can move onto the brickwork and finishing of that building as well. At this stage we are hoping to finish construction by the end of February next year.

Agriculture:

Our agriculture plots is coming along nicely. We have our subsistence crop planted out which takes up an acre of our 8 acre plot: on this plot we have sweet banana, maize, beans, cabbage, onion and tomatoes.

We also currently have 7000 chilli plants on two acres of the plot set aside for cash crops and will be looking at inter cropping this with around 3,500 coffee trees and an additional 5,000 chilli plants come January.

School:

The school itself is running along business as usual. We recently had our enrolment day for next year in which we had around 100 applicants for the forty positions available. This will take our total up to 160 children across kindergarten, year 1,2, and 3.

NUMBER THREE MISSIVE FROM EMYR ON HIS TRAVELS

I thought I'd mention how people relate to me and how I relate to Sri Lankans.

Out in the street the majority of the people are of course SLs and it's only in the hotels where you find European types and there are plenty of those, from Russia, Finland, UK and of course from S E Asia to mention but a few. Incidentally I love the way that SLs when they want to know your country of origin always ask 'from which country are you coming from" with a cunning use of two prepositions.

When they want to know your name I usually say it's Brett Lee. They look perplexed for a while and then smile broadly knowing perfectly well that I am not the very well known to them Brett Lee! There's no doubt that I stand out amongst the population for no reason other than I'm European in origin. I get stared at, smiled at but when you feel that people might be attracted into looking at you they don't! As far as examination candidates are concerned I have yet to see a European type!

Sri Lankans let you get on with your own business but are very happy to respond to chatting. For better or worse I enjoy speaking for example to people next to me on the train – after all you learn much about the people and the country in that way or to hotel staff.

What I don't enjoy is the way that someone who looks clean and tidy sidling up to you and telling you the sob story of losing money for his bus ride home, and can he have 100 rupees which is in fact next to nothing when the exchange is somewhere near 135 Rupees to the Australian dollar. There are beggars and there are beggars!

I work at an arts centre which is not too far away from a mosque and I made the mistake of going for a stroll last Friday lunchtime just as the men were coming out of Friday prayers. What is most pitiful is the number of unfortunate poor people who assemble outside this mosque particularly on Fridays hoping for a handout. They are dressed in rags and as you might imagine they smell. And it's very difficult to pass them by without giving something.

And then you're walking along the street and discover that there's a tuktuk driver stalking you and not taking no for an answer. And then finally on the way from the train station you stop and look at some of the huge number of articles for sale. You make the mistake of showing interest and after deciding that you were only 'window' shopping discover that two of the stall holders have been pursuing you for some 200 metres away not wanting to take no for an answer.

I continue working in SL until the 30th of this month and then travel via Kuala Lumpur to Goa where I'll spend a couple of weeks before heading off home.

St Petersburg Winter Palace



Ship berthed on the outskirts of Moscow, as bridges over the canal too low. Moscow was originally landlocked and a canal was built during Stalin time, by prisoners, to join Moscow with the Volga River. Opened in 1937, the canal is 128 Km long (29 miles longer than Panama). Now used for millions of tons of cargo.
