so far. He couldn't



believe they had done so much in just three days! Nick is on the editorial committee that produces a one page newspaper "RYLAdvocate" each day. We saw one on Tuesday night and it was printed in colour and very professional.

There were over 200 people at the dinner including 80 Rylarians, Rotarians from sponsoring clubs and friends. Guest speaker was Commissioner Shane Fitzsimmons of the NSW Rural Fire Service. Amongst other things, he spoke about his voluntary team of over 72,000, and the RFS Cadet program operating in some schools. Shane also covered the recent fires in NSW and encouraged us to focus on what is saved, not what is lost. He also talked about leadership and how it applied to the RFS. He had some great quotes referring to leadership which I thought were also applicable to Rotary:

- "Working well with people of all ages is vital to being a good leader"
- "Always respect and regard people in your team"
- "One team, many players and one purpose"
- Dealing with pressure: "Try and be better than you are today but don't try and be someone you are not"

Lastly he encouraged everyone to "have a go at making a difference", which is just what we as Rotarians do well.

Nick will be coming to talk to our Club about his RYLA experience and it could be as early as this coming Monday, 20 January.

Snake conservation in India

Dear Michael,

Greetings from Bhopal.

Thanks for the weekly newsletter.

I am also enclosing an article for your information on an activity on snake conservation conducted by our club Rotary Club of East Bhopal, this year. Vishwas has been conducting this for the last 5 years.

In India, we celebrate a Hindu festival called Naag Panchmi wherein all devotees worship the snake. A few myths regarding the snake worship (and also not hurting the religious sentiments of the people) have to be cleared and hence an awareness drive is conducted. This year too the awareness program was conducted in different areas with a lot more of volunteers.

I am enclosing the report filed on the activity to our DG Rtn Nitin Dafria (Dist 3040). Some changes have been made for you to understand better. You can circulate the same to other members also.

Snake Conservation Project

Rotary Club East Bhopal organized the Snake Conservation and Awareness Activity on Nagpanchami, 11-August-2013. This was the fifth consecutive year of making the people aware about the importance of snakes for the preservation of environment and for sensitizing them towards the pain and suffering inflicted upon the snakes in the name of worship. The Assistant Governor Rtn. Col. Mahendra Mishra was also present to encourage the members.

This activity was a part of saving snakes as the next step towards environment conservation – a program initiated by RID 3040. The Members of RC East Bhopal started early in the morning and



reached the pre-identified spots at 7am. This year special efforts were made to activate the government machinery. As a result, the officials and the mobile squad of the Forest Department were also present at Jawahar Chowk Bus Stand. There were more than 25 personnel from the government, including some lady inspectors also, to deal with the women accompanying the male saperas (Snake Charmers). With past experience the places where the snake charmers are more likely to be found are known to the members. The entire team spread out in different parts of the city in separate vehicles, to seize the snakes from saperas and distribute the awareness material to the people.

However, it was a matter of pleasant surprise to all the members that the snake charmers were hard to find! For the past four years it was normal to seize over 70 snakes within the first one hour. But despite the larger team and more intense search, very few snakes could be found. The members were constantly in touch with one another, asking about the status and expressing surprise over not being able to find snake charmers. Even in the hot spots like Jawahar Chowk, Mata Mandir, New Market, other temples and certain colonies where the saperas throng for their business, they were not to be seen.

As a result, only about 65 snakes were seized by the entire team up to 2 pm. On enquiry from the shopkeepers near the temples and other places, the people told the team that due to the concerted efforts of RC East Bhopal for the past five years the number of saperas bringing snakes into the city has reduced considerably. Another effect of the campaign was that saperas were found to have shun their usual attire, the trademark



bamboo basket, the 'potli' (bundle) of clothes and the inevitable "Been" (Snake Charmer's Piper). Instead, many of them were carrying the snake in small polythene or cloth bag and were making rounds silently. The

usual call of "Pilao Naag Ko Doodh" ("come and feed milk to the snakes for worship") was rarely heard by the people.

The authorities of the Forest Department and Van Vihar (Open Zoo) were also happy about this development and credited the members of the Club for the same. The seized snakes were handed over to them at Van Vihar Snake Centre.

As you know I am looking after the Home Stay program for Sydney 2014 and I am in desperate need of your help.

To date we have 96 people registered from various countries seeking home stay and as of today we have no local Rotarians registered to host them.

Just this week I received an email from a Rotarian from Sri Lanka who is seeking accommodation for himself his

wife and two children. He asked for me to confirm his place for home stay as he had an appointment for 7 January to apply for his visa to Australia and required written confirmation of accommodation amongst other things. I had to inform him that I could not guarantee a home stay place at this time.

I am well aware that both of you have many demands on your time and requests to contact your members, however as a Sydney Rotary Family we have offered home stay as part of the Convention and I do not want to let these people down.

I understand that you both have an email register of all members in your Districts and I will be very grateful if you could send out a plea for them to volunteer their homes for home stay. The largest group seeking accommodation is six but the majorities are couples. Remembering that hosts do not have to be registered to attend the Convention".
