## **International Women's Day**

I went along to an International Women's Day event in The Secret Garden at Gordon Library on Friday 7 March. It was a fantastic morning. If they have a similar event next year I will encourage more of our members to attend. The theme of the day was "Inspiring Change" and the three speakers covered it movingly.



The first, Sheila Matete-Owiti, came here from Kenya some years ago and now has her own business as a life/career coach at West Ryde. Amongst other things Sheila encouraged us to grow our own networks and "be part of the ripple effect." Sheila also mentioned that she studied in the USA as a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar and credited that with helping her to be where she is today. I thanked her for mentioning Rotary and told her about our club and invited her to come along.

The second speaker, Amer Akech Achiek, had come from Sudan as a refugee and had a harrowing story,

including family members being killed in Sudan, four years in a hot and dusty refugee camp in Kenya and finally being accepted to come to Australia, for which she is very grateful. Amer said that without her strong mother she would not be here today.

The last speaker was Annabelle Daniel, CEO of Women's Community Shelters, who talked about homelessness and the need for a women's refuge in our community. She is trying to inspire change in our attitude to homelessness. Annabelle said that when most of us think of homelessness, we think of homeless men. Did you know that the new face of homeless people is women over 50 who have suffered through illness, marriage breakdown or migration to Australia? There is also no crisis accommodation for women without dependent children between Lane Cove and the Central Coast. Annabelle is working to change that and I talked with her and gave her my card as I thought our club may be able to help.

In between the speakers there was some multicultural entertainment, including some Chinese Cha Cha which was very graceful. If you ask me, I will tell you more! All in all, I was very glad I went and came away inspired to do more to make a difference.

## Generation Why Rotary?

Last week Rob Hall introduced a video presentation by Michael McQueen, officially titled 'Engaging the next generation in Rotary'. He pointed out that the future of Rotary is the next generation. Currently only 11%

of Rotarians are aged below 40 and only 2% less than

In broad terms, 'Generation Y' means the children of the Baby Boomers. Michael sees them as a huge opportunity from a membership perspective. There are 3 reasons why they are good prospects:

- They are globally minded. Through social media, they have friends everywhere. They believe the world can be changed and that they can make the change. They are looking for a vehicle through which to achieve it.
- 2. They are socially engaged. 76% of them are involved in their communities on a weekly basis.
- They're ambitious and they're in a hurry. They exhibit impatience and urgency. They're looking for opportunities for networking and mentoring. They see Rotarians as people who can mentor them and help them get ahead in their careers.

So why aren't they joining Rotary? There are 3 reasons:

- 1. They don't know who you (Rotary) are. They have only a hazy idea of what Rotary is and does.
- They don't know if they're welcome. Outdated practices and a failure to connect with their interests puts them off.
- 3. They don't know if they have time for Rotary. They're put off by rules and structures. Rotary needs to explain why they should make it a priority in their lives.

Generation Y can be unreliable. They tend to leave decisions to the last minute, in case they get a better offer. They think 'mosaically' - options and contingencies rule their lives - unlike their parents' lineal planning (i.e., in extended time frames). A 6 month roster or planning a conference way ahead is foreign to them.

The next challenge is that Gen Y as a group lacks resilience. Whereas Baby Boomers grew up believing that life is meant to be hard, Gen Y has been conditioned by marketeers and others to expect life to be easy, fair, convenient and exciting. They think 'if it's not easy, it must be wrong'.

Gen Y is 'high maintenance'. It needs to be congratulated, thanked and affirmed. This is the era of self-esteem, which requires constant messages of reaffirmation. This conflicts with the traditional Rotarian culture of 'do your bit for the sake of doing good, rather than for acknowledgement' (as reflected in Rotary's motto 'Service above self' - Ed.) However, Gen Y can be expected to be good at promoting Rotary's successes through public relations.

Michael's next video - to be viewed at a later meeting - looks at strategies to bride the generation gap and involve Gen Y in Rotary.

Following the video, there was vigorous discussion and exchange of ideas amongst those present. It was agreed that the membership committee should make use of the information in the video to devise a program to attract younger people to the club.


