Eugenia: the woman charged with murder of her wife

Tonight we will join the members of the Rotary Club of Lindfield to hear a most intriguing story.



On 5 July, 1920, Harry Crawford was arrested and charged with the murder of his wife Annie Birkett, whose body had been found off Mowbray Road, Lane Cove.

But Harry was not in fact Harry. He was Eugenia Falleni, a woman who had lived as a man in Australia for 22 years.

In his book 'Eugenia' and in this talk, renowned barrister and Crown Prosecutor, Mark Tedeschi QC, explores the story of one of the most extraordinary criminal trials in Australia's legal history.

Capturing what life was really like in Eugenia's times, Mark reveals how the full weight of the law and public opinion came crashing down on her, branding her a complete outcast and a serious menace to the moral fabric of society.

Ken was a Paul Harris Fellow and most pleasant person and a gentleman in all respects. In recent years he had lived down the south coast near his daughter.


David Forsythe adds:


Morning Tea, Concert and Seniors Mayoral Awards

The approximate cost of a return airfare to Seattle via Vancouver is A\$1,850, but we have to book early to secure this rate.



Pride of Workmanship Awards

Michael Midlam introduced the presentation of awards with this address:

Each year the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai show its recognition and appreciation of those in our community who strive for excellence of service in their chosen vocation by presenting Pride Of Workmanship Awards. This year, as perhaps some of you have already noticed, we have chosen to present the awards to mem-



bers of the Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command of the New South Wales Police Force.

I have always believed that the awards that have the greatest significance are those whose recipients have been chosen by their

peers. Tonight, although the Rotary Club of Ku-ring-gai are presenting the awards, the nominations have been made by their fellow officers.

For most of us, the police have always been a part of our lives, to the point where by and large they are almost taken for granted. Often when our awareness is enhanced it is because we have just been booked for a traffic infringement or received a notice of some other minor violation. Needless to say, this new awareness usually takes the form of a minor disgruntlement. At the time we may overlook the fact that causing us to reduce our speed, or to improve the way we drive, may in the long run save our lives.

The New South Wales Police Force, or in fact, any police force, cannot be expected to be perfect. Whenever a problem comes to light, the media seems, in my opinion, to give it much more negative air time than it deserves. I am in no way suggesting that problems should not be reported. I am saying more that I feel they should be kept in perspective.

Being a police officer is not a usual job. When the average working Australian looks forward to the holidays, it is a time when we will be able to take some time off and relax, while a policeman can look forward to the busiest times of the year with long shifts, and often cancelled leave. For most police, there is no such thing as a normal working day. The hours are as rostered, and rosters are made up as required. Response time is expected to be the same, whether an incident happens at four in the afternoon or four in the morning.

From forensic examinations, to meticulous record keeping, to negotiating disputes, attending accidents and emergencies, controlling traffic and crowds, and explaining what is happening to the media, the modern police officer's duties entail more than knowing and enforcing the law. And if that is not enough, we now have the added inclusion of being aware of and protecting us from potential terrorist attacks often planned by random and extremely unstable people.

For all these reasons, I would like to congratulate the officers who are receiving our awards tonight. And I would like to express our appreciation and gratitude not only to these officers, but to the New South Wales Po-

lice in general, and the Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command in particular. Thank you.

Inspector John Gross read the citations before presentation of each of the awards, as follows.

Senior Constable Callan Parsons Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command

Senior Constable Callan Parsons joined the NSW Police Force in January 2007 and undertook his first posting at



Burwood Police Station. He remained at Burwood Police Station for 3 years before transferring to the Orana Local Area Command and taking up General Duties at Narromine Police Station on the 18th of April 2010.

On the 19th February 2012, Senior Constable Parsons transferred to the Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command, where he continued working as a General Duties officer.



Recently, members of the Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command were asked to put forward nominees who consistently display exemplary qualities in the workplace. Senior Constable Parsons was the recipient of several nominations from his peers, who highlighted his high level of competence, motivation and professionalism.

Senior Constable Parsons is regularly relied upon to assist in the training and development of junior staff and is recognised for his knowledge and reliability. He frequently carries out supervisory duties and is held in high esteem.

On the morning of Wednesday 24th September 2014, Senior Constable Parsons and his partner responded to an urgent call for assistance at a Pymble address, relating to a workman who was in cardiac arrest. On attending Senior Constable Parsons carried out CPR for a protracted period, and was actively involved in making every effort to sustain life. After being stabilised the patient was conveyed to the Seventh Day Adventist Hospital.

Unfortunately the male succumbed to his medical condition and had passed away. Senior Constable Parsons and his partner attended the SAN Hospital where they interacted with the deceased's family in a compassionate and respectful manner.

Senior Constable Parsons is regularly acknowledged by his community and his peers, an attribute that is reflected in the number of complimentary letters and good work notations appearing on his service register. Senior Constable Parsons is a credit to the NSW Police Force and is commended for his efforts.

Senior Constable Damian Boyce – Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command

Senior Constable Damian Boyce joined the NSW Police Force in August 2008, and undertook his first posting at Gladesville Police Station, where he remained for 5 years before transferring to the Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command and taking up a General Duties position at Hornsby Police on the 8th August 2013.



Recently, members of the command were asked to put forward nominees who consistently display exemplary qualities in the workplace. Senior Constable Boyce was recognised and received nominations for being diligent, motivated and possessing a strong work ethic.

He is regularly the first to put his hand up to carry out tasks, and is frequently relied upon to work and impart

skills and experience to junior officers within the command.


He is a capable officer who has been recognised for his compassionate attitude and high levels of customer service, a quality that is consistently evident throughout his service record. He demonstrates a proactive approach to policing and frequently yields results in this regard.

On the evening of 17th December 2014, Senior Constable Boyce attended an address in Galston with information a male was armed with a firearm. Further information suggested that this male was also named on several arrest warrants and was occupying a stationary vehicle.

Senior Constable Boyce while in company of Senior Constable Bishop acted swiftly and drew on his Officer Survival Skills to safely effect an arrest, while ensuring limited risk to the public. He controlled the situation and used excellent interpersonal skills. A subsequent search of the vehicle resulted in a further 6 charges relating to the theft of mail and other items. Senior Constable Boyce is commended for his efforts.

Senior Constable Luke Bishop – Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command

Senior Constable Luke Bishop joined the NSW Police Force in May 2009, and undertook his first posting at The Rocks Police Station. He remained at The Rocks until September 2013 before transferring to the Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command and taking up a General Duties position at Hornsby Police Station.



Pro-active policing is an effective tool used by Police to target crime trends and local area "Hot Spots", and has been shown to have a direct correlation in the reduction of crime and crime trends.

During the late evening of Saturday 10th January 2015, Senior Constable Bishop and his partner were patrolling in the Turramurra area, when they located a suspicious male in the basement of the unit complex wearing a black back pack, and in possession of a bicycle. Senior Constable Bishop saw that this male matched the description of a person previously caught on CCTV engaged in theft of mail.

Senior Constable Bishop used excellent investigative and communication skills while questioning this male. A search carried out on the male located a pair of bolt cutters and full set of lock picks amongst other house breaking implements. A black wallet and stolen Visa cards were also located at this time.

Senior Constable Bishop's interaction with the male resulted in a successful conviction at Court, and undoubtedly prevented further offences from being committed within the Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command. Senior Constable Bishop is regularly recognised by Local Area Commander for his proactive approach to policing and his consistent results and is commended for his efforts.

Constable Steven Lee - Ku-ring-gai Local Area Command

Constable Steven Lee joined the NSW Police Force in August 2010, and undertook his posting to Hornsby Police Station. Early within his career Constable LEE was identified as a "stand out" officer, capable and adept at General Duties. He has a strong work ethic, and is highly motivated.

Since his start with the New South

Wales Police Force, he has received 6 acknowledgments of Good Police Work and 9 Complimentary Remarks, an astonishing achievement in view of his years of service.

During April 2013, Constable Lee played a crucial role in the identification of a "drug house" situate in the Waitara area. A search warrant was sought, resulting in several arrests being made, and a large number of cannabis plants being seized from within the dwelling.

In May 2014 Constable Lee started a secondment to the Ku-ring-gai Local Area Pro-Active unit, where he has continued to excel. Constable Lee has consistently continued to demonstrate a standard of work well above his rank level.

Constable Lee recently exhibited high levels of initiative and played an integral and pivotal role in the dismantling of an international break and enter syndicate. This syndicate was responsible for numerous break and enter offences within the Ku-ring-gai Local Area and surrounding areas, and would otherwise have continued committing offences unabated if it were not for the efforts of Constable Lee and other members of the Kuring-gai Pro-Active team.

Constable Lee has shown a good aptitude for plain clothes Policing. He has recently been appointed a full time position within the Kuring Pro-Active team and is commended for his efforts.


In thanking our club for their awards, each of the recipients made the point that they were part of a team and saw their awards as recognition of the team's effort.
