PRESENTATION TO THE ROTARY CLUB OF KU-**RING-GAI**

WHY REINVENT: AUSTRALIA IN THE 21ST CENTU-RY'

Angus M Robinson, Management Committee Member, Reinvent Australia Inc

With the current level of 'soul searching' that is dominating media in Australia at present, can you recall a time when you would describe Australia as "great" Was it during the 2000 Sydney Olympics? The winning of the America's Cup in 1983?, Was it Kevin Rudd's 2008

apology to Stolen Generations?

The description "great" is hard earned but it usually coincides with exceptional results in courage or achievements. It is also a time when the nation pulls together. The purpose seems clear.

Our modern democracy struggles to find unity. The reasons are clear:

- A lack of a national vision
- Increased globalisation of business

• Internal division and politicisation of all issues. Disagreement about equity and 'sharing the load' Reinvent Australia, a NFP incorporated association was established to encourage a conversation around these issues. We don't have all the answers but believe that through the exchange of ideas government policies can be changed and systems can be redesigned.

Reinvent Australia intends to play a leading role in these changes.

I hope tonight to hear your suggestions on what RA can do to advance the nation's prosperity. But before I do let me provide you with some background on Reinvent Australia.

Inspired by a question, "Does Australia need a national strategic plan?", raised by Dr Graham Kenny, MD of Strategic Factors (a member of Mosman Rotary and a former ADG) initially in the LinkedIn discussion group of the Australian Institute of Company Directors, a group of some 17 unaffiliated individuals from the Australian business and industry community met in Sydney on June 20, 2014. Its aim was to address the issue. (The question in fact created the greatest number of comments of any topic at the AICD LinkedIn discussion group – well over 300.)

Over the ensuing months and led by Graham, this question and the process of strategic planning was discussed by the group reviewing a range of recent strategic planning initiatives undertaken by various state governments in Australia (i.e. South Australia, Queensland and NSW), the latter is curious given that most people, including those in government have no idea that NSW has a state plan - the NSW 2021 10-year strategic plan, the NSW 2021 Performance Report 2014-2015, the NSW 2021 Measures Report 2013, as well as industry action plans. The NSW Economic Development Framework was based on consistent themes emerging from the Industry Action Plans, which the NSW Government has been developing since 2011 across seven major sectors of the economy:

- agriculture
- creative industries
- digital economy
- international education and research
- manufacturing
- professional services

visitor economy.

We also looked at other countries, particularly in Asia (China, Korea, Singapore, Taiwan) which have put in place long term plans which set targets associated with wealth creation, revenue per capita etc

In summary, we moved through a process of looking at the need for

- a national strategic plan
- embarking on a planning process
- developing a shared vision eg. 'a clever country', the'

knowledge nation', 'innovative Australia'

and/or initiating conversations about a national purpose involving many voices – societal, industry, business etc In February 2015, the group decided to bring together formally the business and community aspirations for developing a new vision for Australia by establishing a notfor-profit association. Hence on the 27th of February, Reinvent Australia Inc was established under the NSW Associations Incorporation Act 2009.

Reinvent Australia is totally run by dedicated volunteers. With that as background, as a member of the Reinvent Australia Management Committee, I'd really appreciate your input as a guide in designing RA's agenda. This is the very first occasion that we have had the opportunity to seek input from a Community focused group. Where you're sitting, I would like to start some table activity

Please take a sheet of paper per group.

Reinvent Australia is vitally interested in your ideas. So here's the challenge. Would each table please jot down in 5 minutes - your suggestions on where Reinvent Australia should concentrate its efforts. I'd like to collect these sheets so please make your responses legible. If you have any questions during this period please ask me, but to give you an idea of some of the issues that we are currently working with

• Creating a clearer sense of direction that improves the quality of life, living standards and jobs

• Coordinating the efforts of organisations to tackle the challenges that exist in areas like the environment, health, education, infrastructure and the arts

• Improving Australia's competitiveness in the global economy

• Creating new industries which generate jobs for generations to come

Go!

That has been fantastic and I do appreciate your suggestions.

Let me conclude by thanking you for the opportunity to speak to you tonight. Might I leave with two suggested actions for each of you to consider:

1. Visit the Reinvent Australia website (launched last Friday). See what we're up to.

Join RA to keep on top of progress and to support our endeavors.

I noted particularly that one of the questions asked of me related to **anticipated outcomes** from the work of RA. You may recall that I responded by stating that we have recognised that one of the tasks of the Management Committee is to address this issue as a matter of priority. Given that you have kindly offered to get back to us promptly with an over-riding Rotary Club perspective, could I ask you please to consider the following proposition.

If our response to the question, what is Reinvent Australia about, is around: "The government doesn't do this, the country doesn't have that, the politicians aren't, we're selling off all our industries" – in short waffle – we suggest that the response in the listener will be: "This is all BS." You will understand that we don't want to be seen as an organisation of wafflers and wingers. We want to be taken very seriously. In framing your intended response to us, could you consider please recommending a Statement of Outcome, for example, some thing along the lines of

"We would like to see Australia develop a coherent national strategic plan and scorecard that drives the nation's competitiveness."

Our Management Committee is next meeting on Thursday 13th August- if you are able to send me your contribution by COB on Wednesday 12th August, this would be most helpful.

Comment from the WEB reinforcing our Tick program

A tick bite can cause a lifetime allergy to red meat. The Lone Star tick injects a type of sugar found in red meat into the blood, and causes antibodies to be made that cause an allergic reaction when the person later ingests meat with the sugar.

Tick-borne disease

Tick-borne illnesses are caused by infection with a variety of pathogens, including *Rickettsia* and other types of bacteria, viruses, and protozoa. Because ticks can harbor more than one diseasecausing agent, patients can be infected with more than one pathogen at the same time, compounding the difficulty in diagnosis and treatment. Major tick-borne diseases include Lyme disease, Q fever (rare; more commonly transmitted by infected excreta),^[26] Colorado tick fever, Rocky Mountain spotted fever, African tick bite fever, Crimean Congo hemorrhagic fever, tularemia, tick-borne relapsing fever, babesiosis, ehrlichiosis, and tick-borne meningoencephalitis, as well as bovine <u>anaplasmosis</u> and probably the <u>Heartland virus</u>.^[27] Some species, notably the Australian paralysis tick, are also intrinsically venomous and can cause paralysis. A recent find is Candidatus neoehrlichia mikurensis, a bacterium which causes blood clots; present in 9% of rodents, it mainly affects persons with lowered immune defense, and can be cured with antibiotics.^[28]

Mammalian Meat Allergy is a condition caused by tick bites that induce a delayed allergy to <u>red meat</u> (from mammals)^[29] that involves the <u>oligosaccharide</u>, galactosealpha-1,3-galactose: the foodinduced <u>reactions</u>, including <u>anaphylaxis</u>, characteristically present several hours after eating in subjects who have experienced a large local reaction to tick bites up to six months earlier.^{[30][31]}

Eggs can be infected with pathogens inside the <u>ovaries</u>, meaning the larval ticks can be infectious immediately at hatching, before feeding on their first host.^[25]
