This week: Putting competition



Our meeting will be a social gathering with a putting competition and everyone is encouraged to bring their spouses/partners to join in the fun.

As a result of a meeting between Malcolm Braid and Michael Midlam "roughly here are the rules for the competition":

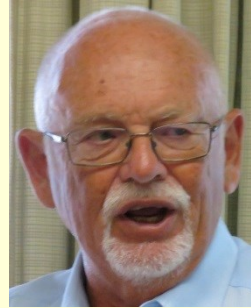
- Non golfers will putt from about 8 metres.
- Golfers will putt from about 16 metres.
- Getting the ball in the hole in one shot scores 15 points.
- Getting the ball in the hole in two shots scores 10 points.
- Getting the ball in the hole in 3 shots scores 5 points.
- Teams will be made up of two golfers assigned to a team on sign in. [*Presumably non-golfers will be the other team members - Ed.*]
- Participants will be allowed about 5 minutes warm up on a non competition hole.
- Each participant will have three balls to obtain a score.
- After the first round the top 5 teams will play off.
- This will continue until there is one clear winner.
- There will be an additional bottle of wine to reward each member of the winning team.
- **Participants will need to pay one gold coin on sign in.**
- **Non participants will need to pay two gold coins on sign in.**
- **Participants will need to wear either soft soled shoes or bare feet.**
- Malcolm and Michael will mark the competition hole.
- Malcolm will supervise the comp and keep score.
- Michael will allocate teams.

Vocational Service Committee plans

The Vocation group has two major projects for this year:

- The Annual Outstanding Employee Dinner – this is our annual event which allows employers - typically in government service - to provide public recognition to their outstanding employees. The “award” consists of participation in a public recognition dinner for the individual and partner, as well as their “manager” who will present a special Rotary certificate explaining what this individual had done over the prior year to earn this recognition. This is especially important for emergency services and other government services personnel who are not eligible for “award bonuses” as might be available in a commercial workplace. This year’s Dinner is scheduled for February 2016. Budget allocated is \$2,000.
- Revitalise local business relationships – over the next few months, we will be reviewing our current databases of local business as well as examining how we can build a closer relationship with these companies. A tentative flyer / questionnaire has already been created to gather individual feedback on what this community would like. Our objective would be to have this ready for distribution at the Bobbin Head Cycle Classic. If any member can provide some graphics design creativity, please let us know. The allocated budget is \$1,000.

In 1986 a group of individuals initiated an annual Christmas lunch for the needy in the Rydalmere area. The concept was simply to give a Christmas experience to those who would otherwise not have one.

Following the death of Stephen Manning, in 2004 the Manning Foundation was established to provide broader support for the needy and disadvantaged. The Foundation now operates ‘Op-Shops’ to earn income, which it applies towards direct relief of poverty, educational programs and the Christmas lunch.
