

This week: Geena Leigh: back from the brink

Geena's story is raw, powerful, provoking ... even disturbing. Most importantly it's real, courageous, honest, and inspirational, for Geena's story is that of a 'working girl' who stepped back from the precipice.

Today, Geena is the bestselling author of "Call me Sasha" which debuted as the #1 bestselling non-fiction book in Australia in 2014. Geena chronicles her life from the



abuse of her father, being thrown out of home and her slide into prostitution and drugs.

When asked why she wrote her memoir Call Me Sasha, Geena's response was: "I thought someone will read the book and say to themselves. 'If she got through all that then I can get through this!' At the very least, I knew I had a story that would entertain."

Last week: Tim Wilson: Advancing human rights in Australia

Australian Human Rights Commissioner Tim Wilson gave us an overview of what his role entails.

Opening his talk, he said that he speaks to many community groups each year and particularly enjoys visiting Rotary clubs because they represent what's good about the Australian community: making a contribution to the community without regard to race, religion and other forms of discrimination.



Australia differs from other countries (notably the USA) in that it does not have a bill of rights which defines people's human rights. Victoria has a Charter of Human Rights and Responsibilities, but federally the debate continues about what are human rights.

Tim's job is to recognise international treaties but not, for example, the International Declaration of Human Rights or property rights. It's about preserving people's freedom and rights (e.g., freedom of speech and of association) and maintaining social cohesion. This can pose challenges, such as "what are the rights of bikie gangs – should they be prohibited?" or "what are the rights of the United Patriots Front (an extreme nationalist organisation) to oppose Islam and the development of mosques?"

Property rights are central to a discussion of human rights. What balance is to be struck between an individual's right to own land and the government's right to compulsorily acquire it? Tim is concerned with ensuring that native title is respected, but he expressed the view that it has very little use in practice. The problem is indigenous people's ability to use it to achieve economic development, health and welfare.

The Human Rights Commission strongly protects religious freedom. Tim said that many challenges in relation to religious freedom are not being properly discussed in Australia. One is the issue of children or teachers being excluded from schools on religious grounds. Similarly, there is conflict between different groups about the exclusion of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and intersex people.

Tim tries to bring people together to discuss issues, develop policies and promote human rights. Current topics include debates over race discrimination and the claim that the Catholic Church's booklet explaining its opposition to same sex marriage contravenes Tasmania's anti-discrimination law.

The Human Rights Commission promotes a culture of mutual respect for other people's views, which Tim believes is more effective than relying on the courts to enforce laws. It is better for community groups to discuss and resolve their differences and develop agreements. People have responsibilities as well as rights.

Responding to a question about the rights of criminals, Tim said every person has the same rights until convicted, when the key right of freedom may be lost. Aboriginal communities have different concepts of law, but for many indigenous people time in prison represents the most stable period of their lives and their best opportunity to learn modern living skills.

Asked to compare human rights and common sense solutions to challenges, Tim said that he constantly has to navigate minefields, evaluating the specific factors applying in each case. Common sense answers often emerge from the context.

The President of the Human Rights Commission, Professor Gillian Triggs, handles issues relating to asylum seekers, but Tim was able to comment. The problem is how to deal with the number of people who want to come to Australia. There are very serious human consequences of the policies adopted by the government, particularly the many negative effects of lengthy incarceration. Australians are overwhelmingly in favour of accepting refugees. Any detention should be short-term and only for identity and health checks. It is acceptable for children to be returned to Nauru or Manus Island, so long as they get proper services and oversight. Otherwise other arrangements need to be made.

Tim said he doesn't get political interference in his job; he simply gets anger from politicians. And yet Tim himself has to make political decisions.



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
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
