This week: Billy Cantwell: Editing the North Shore Times

Billy Cantwell was born and raised in Ireland and came to Australia in 1987, keen to develop a media career.

In 1988, aged 23, he founded the Irish Echo, a newspaper for the Irish community in Sydney. The publication was soon expanded to other Australian cities and established itself as the journal of record for the Irish in Australia.

Billy settled in Balmain, married Kathy and raised three children.

In 2015, after steering the Irish Echo ship for 27 years, Billy decided to seek out other media opportunities and in July 2015 he became editor of the North Shore Times.

He will talk about the shifting media landscape, with particular reference to community journalism.

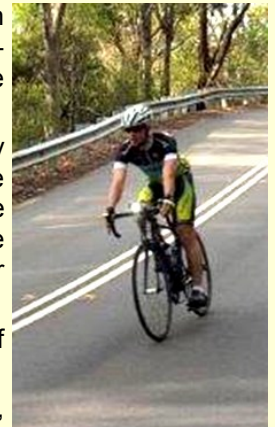
will write the reports of guest speakers' presentations and Geoff Hungerford will complete the sections on notices, rosters etc;

International women's day at Katuuso



March 8th marked International Women's Day, and it appears we're not the only ones to appreciate our female staff. Unbeknownst to the women, the male teachers threw a surprise party for the ladies in honor of their day, complete with an extravagant home-cooked meal, music and dancing. Not only that, but each man decided to "partner" with a woman to ensure that her every need was met for the day. Needless to say the ladies were beyond touched by such a thoughtful gesture.

A woman multiplies the investment made in her future

Development programs that invest in women's futures, be it through education, health or income-generating activities, have been internationally proven to yield effects that extend far beyond the individual.

When women are educated and have control over income, earnings are first spent on families. The benefits are realized by entire communities: **child health and nutrition improve, school enrollment rates increase, agriculture productivity rises and economies grow.**

The United Nations (2008) affirms that investing in fem-

ale education has 'a multiplier effect' on productivity, efficiency and sustained economic growth. When 10% more girls go to school, a country's GDP increases by 3% (USAID).

Women reinvest 90% of their income into their families and communities, spreading prosperity and driving change for future development. Meanwhile, men are found to reinvest only 30% to 40% of their income (Ernst & Young, 2011)

School for Life has seen the 'multiplier effect' in action. We have witnessed the far-reaching impact of increased access to education, skills and basic resources for women in the community. Female vocational students and employees pay SFL's investments forward, building strong families and an even stronger Katuuso village. **Meet the 'evidence'...**

Teddy has gained a great deal of self-esteem from her ability to support her family; she takes pride in independently financing the education of all five children. She enjoys making clothes for them with her newly acquired skills.

Teddy has also been working on her numeracy and administration skills. She was appointed Treasurer of the tailoring group and will be responsible for keeping records of their savings.

Dinners for 8 - first off the blocks

Last meeting: Michael Harvey: The creation of Action Stations



Michael Harvey is Assistant Director of Public Engagement and Research – Australian National Maritime Museum ('ANMM'). He is vitally concerned with the question how to attract more visitors.

The ANMM has 4 key ships: the Endeavour replica, HMAS Vampire (the last of the 'big gun' destroyers, a sister ship of the Voyager), HMAS Onslow (an Oberon class submarine) and the patrol boat HMAS Advance.

In 2012 all visitors could do was walk onto and around the ships, without any introduction or explanation of their special significance, unless they met a museum volunteer for a guided tour.

The international fleet review in October 2013 celebrated the 100th anniversary of the Royal Australian Navy ('RAN'). It coincided with the 100th anniversary of AN-ZAC ('Army Corps'), which overshadows the fact that the first Australian service personnel killed in World War I were sailors in the action between HMAS Sydney and the German cruiser Emden.

ANMM sought to create a new introduction to the RAN for visitors. It began by asking them what they knew and wanted to know. They knew little. They didn't understand the RAN's role in protecting overseas trade or the significance of the Cold War and the RAN's part in it. They didn't want to read information; they wanted to try things and challenge themselves.

ANMM needed to create a new Visitor Centre, to replace several 'temporary' shipping containers that had served

that function for 16 years. Architects designed the centre; ANMM had to design the interior displays.

Michael and his team set out to tell a story. The challenge was how to create an experience for visitors. They turned to film, inspired by the effect of movies such as 'Sink the Bismarck' and 'The Hunt for Red October'.

Using a single long screen, the team developed stories centred around imaginary actions involving each ship. Each movie is no more than 4 minutes long and is a different film genre for each ship.

The film for the Vampire simulates an attack on an enemy ship; the film for the Oberon shows it sneaking up and photographing the enemy ship. (The Advance film is yet to be made.)

The team was advised by the RAN and former RAN personnel (including former commanders of the ships). It was essential that every detail be accurate. The RAN provided 60 personnel for the project.



Visitors re-enact what they see in the films when they get onto the ships. The films are supplemented by interactive displays in the middle of the Visitor Centre, one of the most interesting exhibits being a torpedo (an item which was not easy to source).

Michael commented on the importance of food in maintaining the morale of RAN personnel. He also noted that the stories told by the museum volunteers are the single most important part of visitors' experience.

ANMM is now studying how visitors interact with the various aspects of the Visitors Centre and the ships, with a view to making improvements.

Michael concluded by drawing attention to the ANMM's Classic and Wooden Boats Festival on Friday 15 - Sunday 17 April.

Next week: Ken Zulumovski: Gamarada community healing and leadership initiatives

'Gamarada' is a men's group which emerged out of recognition of unmet needs and lost potential among men in Redfern. It is a community driven program which provides a safe way for indigenous men to come together to heal themselves and aid in the healing of others.

Traditional healing methods form the core of the program, with some eastern and western influences. Throughout the program there is also an emphasis on practical techniques, including stress and anger management and the promotion of life skills.

Ken Zulumovski, managing director of the company that runs the program, will tell us how it operates and benefits the participants and the wider community.
