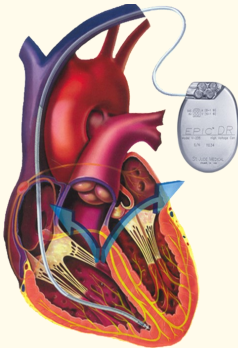

Who would have thought that a presentation on Pacemakers would be fun and interesting? Joanne was interesting and fun and generated many questions.

She started comparing a heart beat to a Mexican wave, but for some, when their heart is beating, not all the participants stand for their turn when the wave is in progress—these people need a Pacemaker to keep their heart beating at a regular rate.

- Approximately 3 million pacemaker patients worldwide and approximately 600,000 implanted yearly
- 1958 saw the first fully implantable pacemaker inserted (Arnie Larsson).



A Pacemaker, left, comprises Header, Battery, Hybrid circuit (brains)

Tiny cables are inserted. Methods are - Epicardial - Endocardial (Transvenous) these are needed to conduct current to the heart

The battery is made of a lithium-iodine compound and lasts from 6 to 10 years when the Pacemaker needs to be replaced

Commonly asked questions

Can I drive?

Catastrophic consequences could result from loss of consciousness while driving

Most Traffic Authorities now have laws pertaining to ICD patients

Decisions about driving are made on an individual basis by the doctor in combination with the RTA

Can I go near a microwave oven?

Two factors allow patients to be near ovens without concern

The shielding and filtering in ICDs has been significantly improved

Leakage levels of the new microwave ovens are much lower than the allowable limit

Do I have to take precautions when using a mobile phone?

Yes and No

A filter in the device will remove mobile phone frequencies so will not affect the device.

There is a magnet in the speaker, so don't carry it in a pocket over the device

Will I have to slow down with a pacemaker? **NO!**

There are patients who play sports such as golf, tennis, basketball, marathons or scuba diving after consultation with their cardiologists.

Any activity restrictions usually result from other medical problems and not from the pacemaker

Is sexual activity safe?

Some people fear that the increase in heart rate will trigger a shock

Some people fear that a shock during sex will be passed to their partner

the energy felt by the partner is only a minor tingling similar to that of static electricity and is not harmful

Is it safe to walk through anti-theft security systems in shops?

It is safe

However, it is best not to linger within a surveillance system

Can I travel? YES!

- Always carrying the identification card given at the time of implant.
- Devices are implanted and checked globally. Patients can have their pacemaker evaluated in almost any part of the world if needed.

Will the pacemaker or defibrillator prevent me from having a heart attack?

-The device does not protect against blockages in blood vessels that cause heart attacks.
