Assembly night—International Budget Georgina Manning

ROMAC - This project supports disfigured children so they can lead a normal life. Romac ensures the child's arrival in Australia for surgery and also supports his or hers post-surgery. \$1000

ROTARIANS AGAINST MALARIA – This project is for the purchase of new Long Lasting Insecticidal Mosquito Nets (LLIN) RAM is encouraging a program in PNG in which we adopt a village and supply the village with the necessary nets. These nets can be washed up to 21 times with RAM encouraging no more than 3 times a year. This also allows the district patrol retreatment program not to be required each year. \$1000

DAYS FOR GIRLS – This project provides washable sanitary supplies and education to girls so they can attend school instead of days of isolation. We have previously teamed up with the Rotary Club of Currumbin in which we supported DFG in Nepal. This year I would like \$1000 to go to Vanuata and \$1000 to continue our work in Nepal. We will team up with Currumbin again with both projects. \$2000

SCHOOL FOR LIFE - This project will be for Solar Power with back up batteries and a generator for a new primary school in Uganda. This project will require a Global Grant and partnership with another Club or Clubs. \$6000

PORT ORLY, VANUATU - This project is in its 2nd stage and requires \$650 to send a teacher in aquaponics to teach the locals. They would also appreciate the support of volunteers at the same time to build work sheds in October. We will again be teaming up with Currumbin. The extra \$350 may go towards supporting a volunteer. \$1000

BENE SCHOOL, VANUATA – This project is for the construction of a primary school. The Rotary Club of Currumbin is waiting for confirmation from the Ministry of Education for it to proceed. \$4000

Tick control

Managing Ticks Around Your Home

- Install animal proof fencing. This prevents the host animals (e.g. bandicoots) coming into your yard where they can drop ticks.
- If there are tick prone areas around the home, install fencing to prevent children from entering those areas.
- Ticks do not like dry conditions! Keep overhanging foliage and leaf litter to a minimum and mow lawns regularly.
- Apply insecticides to areas where ticks occur, you may need the services of a professional pest controller. Ensure that ticks are mentioned on the insecticide label.
- Regularly treat pets to prevent ticks—ask your vet for advice; many dogs and cats die every year from tick paralysis.

Managing Tick bites

Kill the tick where it is using an ether-containing spray. (Ask your pharmacist for suitable)

Then, either wait for it to drop off or seek medical attention for it to be removed taking care to not squeeze the tick because this would cause tick saliva to enter your body, increasing the risk of tick-induced allergies.

- If you have been outdoors, don't scratch anything that itches until you have a look at it
- **Don't try "picking" a tick out of your skin with tweezers or other tick-removal gadgets**

Apply permethrin cream to kill these ticks
