The Pride of Workmanship Awards are an annual event in the calendar of many Rotary Clubs. The awards are a public acknowledgement of employees in the community who have displayed excellence in their chosen vocation. Many staff turn up for work and do what is expected from them. However there are those who go beyond the norm and provide a great example to their peers of going beyond what is expected.

Tonight we have chosen to present 3 awards to members of the Ku Ring Gai Local Area Command of the New South Wales Police Force.

Whilst our Club is presenting the awards, the nominations have come from the peers and fellow officers of the individuals which adds to the significance of the Awards.

Now for most of us, the police have always been a part of our lives, to the point where by and large they are almost taken for granted. No doubt some of you have had a road side chat with a police officer for an infringement or some other misdemeanour . Whilst this meeting may take the form of a minor disgruntlement we often overlook the fact that causing us to reduce our speed, or the way we drive, may in the long run same our lives.

Being a police officer is not a usual job. Come the holiday season when many are on the beach and enjoying the holiday season, often the police are at their busiest with long shifts, and often cancelled leave. For most police, there is no such thing as a normal working day, with rotating shifts and disruption to family time with emergencies and roster changes. The response time is expected to be the same whether an incident happens at four in the afternoon or four in the morning.

From forensic examinations, to meticulous record keeping, to negotiating disputes, attending accidents and emergencies, controlling traffic and crowds, and explaining what is happening to the media, the modern police officer's duties entail more

than knowing and enforcing the law. And we can add to this list includes potential terrorist attacks and protecting our safety and livelihood.

We congratulate the officers receiving our awards tonight. We express our appreciation and gratitude to the New South Wales Police Force, and in particular the Ku Ring Gai Local Area Command who provide a great service with the BHCC in March each year.

I now invite Commander Jennifer Scholz to read the citations.

Sgt DAY

Sgt Day has been a member of the NSW Police Force since 1997, having performed duties at a number of Local Area Commands in both the Sydney and



Regional NSW locations. She presently performs as a General Duties Team Leader within the Kuring-Gai Local Area Command, leading and managing the duties of a number of junior ranking uniformed officers.

Sgt Day is a role model to these officers in terms of her knowledge and experience as an operational Police Officer and leader, providing timely

and valuable advice to officers in the field in response to the challenges they face in performing their duties. At present Cheryl is undergoing the requisite training which shall see her in the near future promoted to Commissioned Officer rank as an Inspector within the New South Wales Police Force.

Sgt Day always demonstrates an exceptionally high standard of professionalism, diligence and integrity which she not only demands of herself, but obtains from her subordinates, thereby ensuring the provision of the utmost diligence in the protection of the community. This was no clearer demonstrated than when she took Command of Police responding to a stabbing incident at Westfield's Hornsby which resulted in the successful disarming and arrest of the offender responsible.

Senior Constable BAKER

Senior Constable BAKER, has been a member of the NSW Police Force since



2006. He is a pivotal and highly valued member of the Command's Crime Management Unit. After a number of years performing General Duties at the Command, Malcolm has become the Domestic Violence Liaison Officer at the Kuring-Gai Local Area Command. This position brings with it the

significant and onerous responsibility of reviewing every Domestic Violence incident reported to the Command, ensuring the short and longer term needs of its victims are met. This includes effectively liaising with other agencies to ensure appropriate support as well as protection is afforded those individuals and very often their children as well. With the excellence Malcolm brings to the role he is an invaluable source of information and assistance for the other Police Officers at the Command in their dealing with Domestic Violence incidents.

Additionally, Senior Constable BAKER attends Court with every victim in relation to every Domestic Violence related matter before the Court assisting, supporting and advising these victims throughout that process. The importance of this role within the Command cannot be understated and it is of course common knowledge the effective intervention of Police into Domestic Violence incidents reduces the commission of such offences. The excellent level of protection and assistance provided by this Command to such vulnerable members of the community is the result of Malcolm's professionalism and diligence. Such effective intervention is the result of the performance of Malcolm in his role and is a tangible facet in the minimisation of domestic violence and the protection of its victims.

It is through the exceptional motivation and quality Malcolm brings to this role which has made it a success in this Command and another way in which the community is kept safe from harm and crime.

Since undertaking the role he has been active in the investigation and targeting of a number of high value criminal targets within the Command, effectively and successfully with his team detecting and arresting such offenders for multiple counts of serious crimes.

The significant results achieved and the professional manner in which those duties are performed make Lars a significant asset to the Command in the prevention of crime and the protection of our community.
